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the Platform Principles

Federalist Party Platform

The Federalist Party has deemed the following issues to be of immediate and pertinent importance to the state of West Virginia.

1. Education

- 1.1. Create new ways for students to prepare for college
- 1.2. Find new avenues of funding to help the state's brightest and hardest working students pay for their education
- 1.3. Work to educate students on the workings of the United States and West Virginia's political systems
- 1.4. Help students find out to educate themselves about candidates and their stances
- 2. Health Care Reform
 - 2.1. Make benefits available to all citizens
 - 2.2. Make medical insurance more affordable
 - 2.3. Work on malpractice reform that would both keep doctors in state and protect the rights and health of the citizens
 - 2.4. Find new ways to make prescription drugs more affordable to seniors
- 3. Gas Tax and Law Reform
 - 3.1. Lower the gas tax in an attempt to lower the burden on business and individuals, helping to stimulate economic growth
 - 3.2. Promote the development of alternate fuels to protect West Virginia's environment and make the state a leader in reducing dependence on foreign-produced oil
- 4. Jail and Prison Reform
 - 4.1. Create and improve community corrections systems to help lower jail populations
 - 4.2. Find ways to use correction facilities to improve communities and rehabilitate inmates in a more effective manner
 - 4.3. Instate the death penalty as a possible punishment for capital offenses
- 5. Public Smoking
 - 5.1. Instate an official statewide ban on smoking in establishments such as restaurants

 - 6.1. Make living wills legally binding by making provisions that give such wills full authority under the law

- 8. Communications System Development

 - 8.5. Extend the availability of high speed internet and wireless phone service to include all West Virginians
 - 8.6. Make the mentioned service accessible and affordable to as many West Virginians as possible
 - 8.7. Set in place legislation that will help protect consumers from unfair and unethical billing and scam practices instituted by communications companies

Electronic Voting

As everything from mail to games are becoming electronic, so is voting. As of 2006, fifteen counties in West Virginia must change over to the Ivotronic Touch Screen Voting Machines.

Danny Cline who works for Casto & Harris Inc. stationed in Spencer, WV was here at Boys' State to give a presentation about these new electronic voting systems. Throughout his presentation he demonstrated the security and indestructibility of these systems. Being that the units are not equipped with internet access, hacking is practically impossible.

Since Congress' passing of the law prohibiting lever or punch ticket ballot systems, fifteen counties in WV must switch over to these systems. These units are promising to make for an easy change.
