The Nationalists elected John Frye as the 19th governor of Boys' State last night but lost the Board of Public Works 4-3 and the Supreme Court 4-1 to the Federalists.

Complete totals for all races are listed on page two today.

One race remains in doubt this morning. Federalists Edward Bunner and Larry Martin are tied for fifth place on the Supreme Court. The tie will be broken today by lot as required by the MBS constitution.

The Federalists also took the State Senate by a 16-10 margin but were edged out in the House of Delegates 27-25 by the Governor's party. The split in the Legislature will probably give Gov. Frye trouble in getting passage of his legislative program.

==The tie for fifth place in the Supreme Court of Appeals was broken by lot early this morning with Larry Martin being declared the winner.==

The inaugural ceremonies have been set for 4:30pm today in the Amphitheater located behind Mongolia County. The oath of office will be administered to the Governor, members of the Board of Public Works and the Supreme Court by Judge Chauncey M. Browning, a member of West Virginia's Supreme Court of Appeals.

Final returns on the legislative race were not in until after 1:00 a.m. today. They were slowed by the interruption in county voting by the trip each county took to the three voting machines. One was located in the State Police headquarters, one was at GHQ, Harrison County, while the third was at Kanawha County.

Following the assembly program last night, both political parties staged torchlight parades on the camp grounds to make a last minute impression on voters before the polls were opened. Each party had a motorcade and music from its members of the Boys' State band.

Monroe, Braxton, Upshur and Calhoun have advances to the semi-finals of the state baseball tourney and will meet at 2:30 today to determine the championship round. Monroe swamped Webster 12-0 while Braxton edges Lewis 3-1 yesterday in upper bracket games. Upshur shut out Gilmer 5-0 and Calhoun barely squeezed by Kanawha 3-2 in the lower bracket.

In upper bracket volley ball, Marion dropped its first game but took the next two from Calhoun. Upshur beat Gilmer two straight. The Braxton-Webster and Lewis-Monongalia contests went three games.
