"It was served by Abe Lincoln, Theodore Roose-velt, and Harry Truman, to name only a few of the famous leaders who were members." He explained that the Guard is completely volunteer and differs from the Army in that, in addition to being pledged to loyalty to the nation, the Guard members are also pledged to the state. Although the guard is primarily militaristically inclined, it may be called out by the state in times of floods, fires, tornadoes, prisôn riots, and missing person calls.
