## NATIONAL GUARD KICKS OFF FRIDAY ASSEMBLY

At the beginning of Friday evening's assembly, Mr. Lincoln Cox, Assistant Chief Counselor of Boys' State, presented his closing remarks and farewell message of good wishes to the citizens of the 1962 Boys' State.

He also read the statement from Congressman Kenneth Auvill of Barbour County to the citizens.

Next on the agenda, Captain Robert Henderson of the W.Va. National Guard was presented to the group. Captain Henderson proceeded to give a brief sketch of the National Guard, its history, requirements, duties, and background. "The National Guard is older than the nation", the captain reported. "It was served by Abe Lincoln, Theodore Roosevelt, and Harry Truman, to name only a few of the famous leaders who were members." He explained that the Guard is completely volunteer and differs from the Army in that, in addition to being pledged to loyalty to the nation, the Guard members are also pledged to the state. Although the guard is primarily militaristicly inclined, it may be called out by the state in times of floods, fires, tornadoes, prison riots, and missing person calls.

## PRESIDENT HURLEY AND REV. CUTLIP SPEAK TO CITIZENS

Friday evening's assembly concluded the last full day at the 25th Annual Mountaineer Boys' State.

As the program began, the 347 campers were introduced to the Reverend George Cutlip of Salem College. A devoted Legionnaire, Cutlip has served as West Virginia Department Chaplain under Chief Counselor Phillips and as Chaplain of Boys' State for five years. He in turn introduced the principal guest speaker for the evening, Dr. K. Dwane Hurley, President of Salem College.

In a very unique delivery, the President urged the citizens to live a life of constant activity that we may prepare for our call in life. "Our life speaks for us, as you and I are walking speeches. What we do is so loud that no one can hear what we say."

Dr. Hurley also mentioned the nation's great need for people that will speak up for good government. "By the year 2,000, the world population shall rise to four billion human inhabitants. We must prepare to safeguard the physical and spiritual needs of all these people. Let us endeavor to speak up for the infinite; for our nation was founded on a belief in God. Life is empty unless God is in it."

In conclusion, Hurley dynamically pointed out that we must speak for others and for ourselves. "We must elect to lose ourselves in others in order that we may find ourselves."
