He will arrive late this afternoon and is to remain for dinner, at which he will make a brief talk.

He will be accompanied by two aides.

Steve Hill of Wheeling heads the Federalist ballot and Daniel T. McCutcheon of Parkersburg is the Nationalist nominee in the gubernatoria race at 1972 Mountaineer Boys! State.

General election balloting will take place from 9 to 10 o'clock tonight.

Hill of Panhandle County defeated 13 other candidates for the Federalist nomination with a wide margin between his vote of 81 and the next highest candidate, Norman Trowbridge, 32.

Other Federalists seeking gubernatorial nomination were John Burnell Higginbotham, 18; Thomas W. Whitehouse, 11; Mark D. Moreland and Harold Smith I each 9; Sam Arose and Junior Taylor, each 7; Charles Missner and Anthony Pizatella, each 3; David Boothe and David A. Stover, each 2, and Byron M. Mills and David Bilotta, each 1.

The Nationalist winner, McCutcheon of Calhoun County led a field of nine candidates with a long lead, getting 64 votes. Next highest was Eddie Parker, 35, followed by Andrew Warner, 22; Doug Lovejoy, 17; Gordon D. Jones, 15; Paul Hermeling, 11; John Taylor, 9; Rick Lunaford, 6, and Lewis E. Smith, 5.

SECRETARY OF STATE In the secretary of state's races, Mike Watts of St. Albans won a wide victory over nine other candidates on the Federalist ticket and Mike Pearms of Hantington eased in with a closer margin over seven other Nationalist contenders.


In Federalist balloting, Watts of Kanawha County polled 45; Phil Mc-Ginnis, 26; J. Neil Parsons, 24: Greg Campbell, 22; Roger Lee Full, 18; Jim Richmond, 17; Danny Groseclose, 11; John Haller and Arnold Green Jr., each 10, and Roger L. Williams, 4.

In Nationalist voting, Pearman of Monroe County drew 44; Tim Humphreys, 38; David Campbell, 28; Gage Lightner, 22; Marvin Frank Meddings, 18; David Allen McKinney, 15; Greg Harr, 10, and Michael Hyre, 7.

ATTORNEY GENERAL

Federalists chose Sam Merandi of Clarksburg and Nationalists picked William S. Winfrey II of Princeton for Attorney general candidates.

Nationalists actually elected Rod Dickerson with 55 votes, but he was disqualified by bar examination results, as were John Zegeer, who polled 27 Continued on Sports Page

"turn it around" and stop the fall of the United States as "the greatest nation in the world."

Bobby Bowden, head football coach at West Virginia University, established immediate rapport with the 371 Boys! Staters by telling one joke after another—mostly on himself—and promising to beat Penn State—possibly next year.

"We haven't beaten Penn State since you were born," he told Boys' Staters, most of whom are age 17. "I promised the alumni that it would not be another 17 years--16 maybe, but not 17--and I feel that next year we're going to get nose to nose!"

The coach told of a football player who had made an early yardage gain and then witched tactics, without success. Isked by the player later what he had lone wrong, Coach Bowden had told him, You forgot how you got there."

Using this analogy as he switched to erious vein, Coach Bowden said Americans oday are "forgetting how we got here." his nation was founded by godly men."

Bowden reminded Boys! Staters of the istorical fact that "Nations, people and mpires fall if they disobey God-they re punished--" and that there are signs hat the United States--the greatest of ll nations--is at the brink of beginning he downgrade.

He urged "this new generation" to "turn t around" by honoring God and serving heir fellow men. "Figure God in, and igure your fellow man in. We need to ove each other more!"

Bowden received a standing ovation at ne beginning and a thunderous applause to the end of his challenging talk.

Prior to Bowden's enthusiastically—sceived speech, State Treasurer John ally spoke briefly on the state's balaced budget system, which prohibits a efficit budget.

He told the boys that \$300 million ould be spent by West Virginia this year id an equal amount is expected from venue.

Kelly also spoke of the Interstate and palachian highways now being built in a Mountain State. He envisions that ese new roads will end regionalism in a state.

"This will open up West Virginia so we n work together as West Virginians! he clared.
