HILL WINS NARROW VICTORY

ROCKEFELLER URGES BOYS' STATERS TO KEEP IDENTITY, IMPROVE STATE

Secretary of State John D. Rockefeller IV, Democratic candidate for West Virginia governor, urged Mountaineer Boys' Staters Tuesday evening to struggle to maintain individuality after they are subjected to economic and social pressures of adulthood.

"You'll have to conform to some extent," he conceded, explaining that the responsibility of providing for families forces that, "but don't be afraid to speak out.

"You are the strongest, the brightest, the best in West Virginia," he reminded them, referring to their being selected to attend Boys' State.

"Rockefeller was introduced at dinner by Boys' State Administrator Tommy E. Jones as being the first West Virginian ever recognized by the U.S. Jaycees as one of the "Ten Outstanding Young Men in America."

After dinner, Boys' Staters noted, Rockefeller followed the dining hall rule of carrying his own plate and cup to the conveyer in the kitchen. He chatted with several boys on his way back to the head table, where he spoke after elevating the microphone to his tall height.

He brought a prepared speech, but put it aside and spoke informally after Boys' Staters had given him a rousing cheer following his introduction.

The outgoing friendliness of Boys' Staters was not lost on the speaker, who commented that "There are no assassins here."

He pointed out that the men who shot President Kennedy and later the President's brother, Robert, and more recently another presidential campaigner, Gov. George Wallace, were "all quiet, introverted, alien men....There must have been a lot of people who were cruel to them....They were different, so they were left alone...."

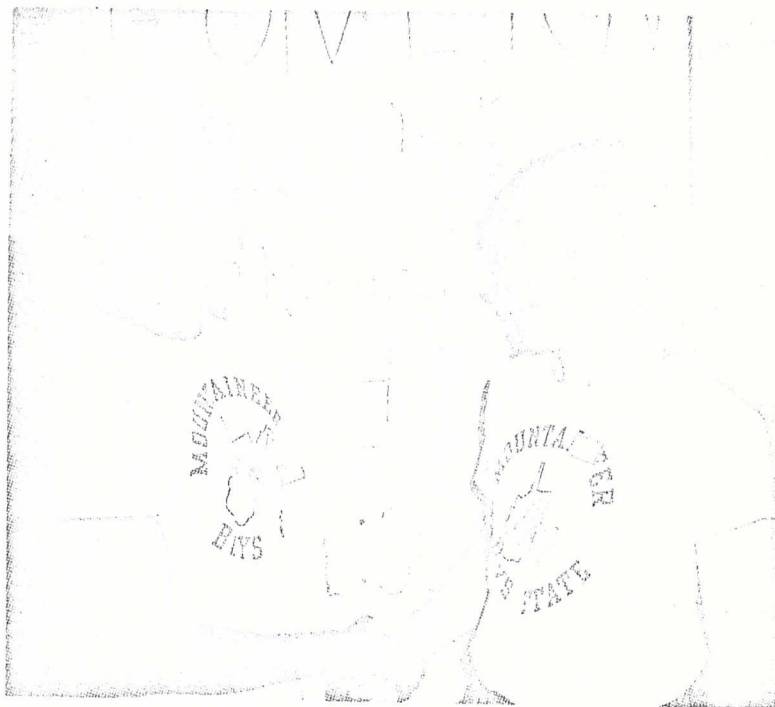
There are people, deplored Rockefeller who feel bigger when they are putting the other fellow down.

Calling Boys' Staters "different and special," Rockefeller urged them to stay in West Virginia.

"I believe strongly in the future of West Virginia," he declared. "I spent 10 years of my life living in Tokyo and New York--the biggest of them all."

"Give West Virginia a chance. Fight for West Virginia. Say 'That is what I am. This is what I stand for. This is me. I'm going to make it better!'"

Aides Frank Poueymiron and Cameron Keyser accompanied Rockefeller here in Rockefeller's campaign motor-van.

RECOUNT CHANGES SECRETARY OF STATE WINNER FROM WATTS (P) TO PEARMAN (N)

Steve Hill of Wheeling, Federalist candidate from Panhandle County, with 188 votes, won a narrow victory over the Nationalist candidate from Calhoun County, Daniel E. McCutcheon of Parkersburg, 173, in the Boys' State general election Tuesday.

An even more narrow margin of three votes giving Federalist Mike Watts of St. Albans (Kanawha County), 181, the office of secretary of state over the Nationalist candidate, Mike Pearman of Huntington (Monroe County), 178, was contested by Pearman.

The recount showed at 2 a.m. today that Pearman, not Watts, is the winner by a single vote. Pearman's total is 181 and Watts' total is 180.

A recount in the Supreme Court judge tallying proved indecisive, with two Nationalists tied for fifth place, throwing the decision into the Joint Session of the Legislature this morning.

The two who are tied with 168 votes each are Bob Reber of Grafton (Randolph) and Mark Harmon of Weirton (Monroe), one of whom will have the judgeship initially counted for a Federalist, John Byard of Moundsville (Barbour) whose 168 votes dropped to 165 in the recount.

The four judges assured of benches are Harry Gustavis Shaffer III of Madison (Lewis), 187; Paul Beard of Martinsburg (Kanawha), 186, and Bill Miller of South Charleston (Randolph) 184, all Federalists, and John Jessee of Princeton (Calhoun), 174.

Office with their candidate, Charlie Underwood of Fairview (Kanawha) polling 196 to the 158 votes given to the Nationalist, Sam Romine of Nitro (Braxton). Nationalists captured the auditor's office however, with Stephen Douglas McCarus of Charleston (Gilmer) getting 206 votes to the 156 of the Federalist candidate, John Leari of South Charleston (Marion). It was an almost reverse figure in the commissioner of agriculture race, with Federalist Tim Taylor of Padon City (Gilmer) polling 206 and Nationalist Daniel H. Underwood of Salem (Panhandle) receiving 133.

The new officers will be inaugurated at 3:30 p.m. today in the Assembly Hall, with Supreme Court Judge Fred C. Caplan of Charleston administering the oaths of office so to be inaugurated is the new State Superintendent of Schools, Timothy L. Collins of Wheeling (Randolph) a member of the Board of Public Works.

CRIME FIGHTER JOSEPH LAURITA SPEAKS ON WEST VIRGINIA DAY

Speaking on West Virginia Day, Joseph Laurita of Morgantown urged Boys' State at luncheon Tuesday to remember always and guard the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, "which gives me the right to stand before you here today."

Laurita is prosecuting attorney of Monongalia County and Republican candidate for West Virginia attorney general. He became known as a crime-fighter after his car was bombed during the time he was pressing an investigation of drug peddling in Monongalia County. He still limps from injuries sustained then.

"Little did I realize, as I was growing up," said Laurita, "that I would be involved in changing the establishment, but I found out that I, as an individual could make changes, and you can, too."

Only in America, said Laurita, could a man aspire to become a lawyer and a prosecuting attorney when his father was on WPA during the Depression.

Family meals then, observed Laurita, were not "half the meals" being served at Boys' State.

Laurita was introduced by Past Department Commander Tim Ashcraft, counselor for Randolph County, a former member of the West Virginia House of Delegates
