SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT TAYLOR MAKES

FIFTH ADDRESS TO BOYS' STATERS

Dr. Daniel B. Taylor, State Superintendent of Schools, delivered his fifth address in as many years to Boys' Staters last night. Echoing the observations of many, Dr. Taylor declared, "This is the most enthusiastic group I've ever seen."



Dr. Taylor also echoed the comments of Sunday night's speaker, WVU head football coach Bobby Bowden when he said, "You are the luckiest young people in the state. From among 25,000 high school juniors in West Virginia, only a few have this opportunity."

Taylor said citizens were learning about democracy in the best kind of atmosphere, "experience."

Taylor went on to outline what he considers the three biggest advantages of Boys' State. "First," he said, "you experience that important ability to get along with other people. Of knowing how to relate individually."

Taylor said most of the violence in this country is a result of people not getting along with members of their own families.

Secondly Taylor said citizens of Boys' State learn to get along in groups in a time when all over the country groups cannot get along. Said Taylor: "The poor don't like the rich, the whites can't get along with the blacks, the North can't get along with the South, and people on the other side of the earth think each other strange, but if they'd only wait 12 hours, they'd be on the other side."

Thirdly, Taylor said Boys' State emphasizes a very important energy resource. "In this day of energy crises, we think of energy as oil, solar energy, coal or nuclear energy, but one kind of energy, the most scarce resource of all, one which we take for granted, is that one that weighs three pounds per person, the human brain," Taylor said. "It's different from other resources," he continued, "because you don't use it up by using it . . . the more you use it, the more you have."

In a hotly contested primary marked by recounts in four races, Shannon Parker of Martinsburg (Randolph) and Sam Spenia of Clarksburg (Panhandle) were nominated for governor by the Nationalist and Federalist parties respectively. Parker beat opponent, Michael Aloï of Farmington (Panhandle) by nine votes, while in the Federalist camp, Spenia won by nine votes also over Mark Spiker of Inwood (Gilmer).

Results of the balloting were not tallied until 2:30 a.m. today due to recounts in the Secretary of State, Attorney General and one Supreme Court race in the Nationalist election. The only recount which accounted for any change in winners was for a Supreme Court seat in the Federalist election. Initial tallies showed Ron Martin of Charleston (Lewis) the victor over William Sinclair, Bethlehem (Calhoun) 84-83. The recount showed Sinclair the winner 89-84.

SECRETARY OF STATE

Roger Swoger of Clarksburg (Panhandle) won the Nationalist nomination defeating Mark Neil of Beckley (Gilmer) by one vote. For the Federalist, Brian Cox of Parkersburg (Marion) got his party's nod over Charles H. James II of Charleston (Kanawha).

ATTORNEY GENERAL

The Nationalist elected Jaycee Collins of Bluefield (Marion). Collins beat Steve Freshwater of Welch (Randolph) in a recounted race, 58-55. Mark Quagliotti is the Federalist candidate beating opponent Jerome Front of Wheeling (Webster) 77-59.

TREASURER

For Treasurer the Nationalists picked Richard Scharf of Charleston (Kanawha) who beat Sidney Short of Cottle (Marion) 78-40. The Federalists' choice was Walt Warren of Milton (Upshur) who won handily over Terry Spangler of Whitesville (Panhandle) 77-42.

AUDITOR

The Nationalists elected Steven Lip-pitt of Charleston (Upshur) over Rick Eaton of Huntington (Panhandle). Lip-pitt won by 10 votes. The Federalists chose Dale Loudermilk of Belle (Marion) over Thom Haller of Weston (Gilmer). Loudermilk won by three votes.

COMMISSIONER OF AGRICULTURE

Greg Stone of Sandyville (Marion) got the Nationalist nod over opponent Charles Dransfield. Stone won 68-29. In the Federalist camp, Tim Carroll of Hurricane (Panhandle) was elected over Ray Farmer of Wellsburg (Kanawha) 68-45.

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"Remember just those things about Boys' State," he said, "then your experiences will have been worthwhile."

During a question and answer session (which Taylor says he prefers) Taylor was asked about his feelings on the behavior of people involved in the Kanawha County textbook protest.

"I deplore violence for the purpose of imposing ones will on another group," he said. Taylor said whether the books are good or bad, people should not resort to unlawful means to air their grievances. He said he appreciates a person's right to speak, to assemble, and to picket, but he cannot condone violence.

Governor Loebe asked Taylor his opinion of the purpose of education in the U.S. Taylor joked about it being a loaded question because Loebe had given him two alternative answers: Should the student be given a liberal education with wide exposure to different ideas, or should education be the transmission of parents' beliefs to the students?

Taylor said he favored the liberal, unrestricted education. "We need to know about the world around us. True, learning cannot be hindered or restricted. But," said Taylor, "in the elementary schools especially, parents may expect the school system to teach beliefs which are not offensive to their own."

Taylor said it may sound impossible, but the school systems must try to strike a happy medium in education.

Taylor also told citizens, the State Board is currently printing handbooks of students' rights which will be available to them in the fall at the start of the school year.

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SUPREME COURT OF APPEALS

The Nationalists elected Bill Cipriani of Wellsburg (Marion), Kelly Jackson of Keystone (Marion), Jeff Devol of Williamstown (Lewis), Jeff Haught of New Martinsville (Lewis), and Clinton Smith of Clendenin (Kanawha). Initial results showed Smith and Roger Wooden of Welch (Monroe) tied for one of the seats with 71 votes each, but on a recount, Wooden lost two votes giving Smith the victory.

The Federalists elected Ed Humphrey of Huntington (Gilmer), Eddie Ayers of Huntington (Kanawha), Sam Giese of Clarksburg (Marion), Don Toothman of Bridgeport (Marion), and William Sinclair of Bethlehem (Calhoun). Initial tallies showed Ron Martin of Charleston (Lewis) ahead of Sinclair by one vote, but the recount put Sinclair ahead 89-84.

Campaigning is expected to be hot and heavy today as candidates prepare for tonight's general election.

214 PASS BAR EXAMS

Of the 363 citizens of Boys' State, 214 (59 per cent) passed the bar exams. Last year, according to Political Advisor Jack Miller, only 51 per cent passed.

The results, announced in last night's assembly, showed Panhandle beat all comers in the bar exams as 39 of the cottage's 50 residents (78 per cent) passed. Monongalia, with 62 per cent passing, and Marion and Webster tied for third with 61 per cent.

Sixteen citizens made top scores on the exam. Three scored 92 per cent, nine scored 90 per cent, and four had scores of 88 per cent. Those with 92 per cent scores were: Harold E. Ayers (Kanawha); Timothy L. Frye (Monongalia); and Mark E. Spiker (Gilmer).

Scoring second highest with 90 per cent were: William A. Bray, Jr. (Kanawha); Adrian H. Haynes, Jr. (Monroe); Jeff Haught (Lewis); David A. Hunt (Braxton); David L. Meadows (Upshur); Jeffrey F. Smith (Monroe); Jeffrey W. Richardson (Lewis); Rodney R. Vance (Kanawha); Richard L. Watkins (Upshur).

In the 88 per cent group were: William G. Fisher (Marion); Vernon A. Kinneer (Panhandle); Alan R. Rotruck (Calhoun); and Jack W. Stratton (Braxton).
