SPENIA WINS ELECTION

Seventeen-year-old Sam Spenia of Clarksburg (Panhandle) has been elected Governor of the 38th Mountaineer Boys' State. The Federalist Governor beat his Nationalist opponent, Shannon Parker of Martinsburg (Randolph) 197-160. The Federalists took eleven of the seven offices on a platform which pledges to advance the needs of youth in West Virginia.

In the Secretary of State's race, Nationalist Roger Swoger, also of Clarksburg (Panhandle) thumped opponent Brian Cox of Parkersburg (Marion) 201-155. Federalist Mark Quagliotti of Brownnton (Marion) won his race for Attorney General, defeating Nationalist Jaycee Collins of Bluefield (Marion) 217-142. Federalists also took the Treasurer's race with Walt Warren of Milton (Upshur) beating Nationalist Richard Scharf of Charleston (Kanawha) 196-159.

The Nationalists bounced back in the Auditor's race with Steven Lippitt of Charleston (Upshur) winning over Federalist Dale Loudermilk of Belle (Marion) 194-165. Federalist Tim Carroll of Hurricane (Panhandle) was elected Commissioner of Agriculture by a 10-vote margin over Greg Stone of Sandyville (Marion) 190-170.

At press time, election officials termed the Supreme Court race "wide open" as a recount was in progress. Details on the outcome will be announced tomorrow.

BROWNING SAYS: "BUTTERING-UP"-NO WAY TO GET VOTES

State Attorney General Chauncey Browning, Jr., told citizens yesterday following the noon meal that in today's political campaigns, "buttering up" is no way to get votes. Browning said in the early days of political campaigning candidates regularly made outlandish campaign promises, "but not now."



"The most important things in campaigning today," he said, "are honesty and character. The only way to do it," said Browning, "is to be honest with yourself, develop character, and you've got to work."

"West Virginia's got problems," he said, "and we can't solve them without leadership, and we can't have leadership without you. West Virginia is the finest state in the Union, and Boys' State is the finest organization of its kind. The only way you could improve it, would be to combine girls' and Boys' State," Browning said, to an energetic round of applause from the citizens showing their approval of his last suggestion.

To those who ran for office and were defeated Browning said it takes a lot of courage to run and that many have tried and failed only to become successful later on because they persevere. To the nominees, Browning said, "Keep it clean and honest." He also offered congratulations to those who will be elected.

In parting, Browning asked citizens to work a little harder next year, make a little better example of themselves, and to "dedicate yourselves to West Virginia."

FORMAL REVIEW PLANS

Boys' State Administrator Tommy E. Jones has announced tentative plans for Thursday's formal review and visit by Governor Arch A. Moore, Jr.

All citizens will be required to attend in formal dress, which, according to Jones, is a plain white Boys' State T-shirt and long dark trousers. Jones emphasized that the blue-trimmed T-shirts are not to be worn.

Governor Moore is scheduled to arrive between 4 and 4:30 p.m. Thursday. He will take his place on the reviewing stand located on the athletic field across from GHQ (Harrison). Along with the Governor on the reviewing stand will be Boys' State Administrators, the Board of Public Works, and the five Supreme Court Justices.

After the review, the Governor will join citizens for the evening meal and will address them.

"THE COLDEST SHOW ON EARTH"

The citizenry of Boys' State was treated to a Cryogenic (Liquid Nitrogen) Science show last night. The show was conducted by Harry T. Zika, a project scientist for Union Carbide Corporation's South Charleston, W.Va. plant.

Zika employed a number of entertaining tricks to illustrate the practical uses of liquid nitrogen. While pouring the nitrogen from a special container, Zika said, "this is the Coldest Show on Earth," referring to the minus 320-degree F temperature of the substance.

He said liquid nitrogen is used to refrigerate the insides of trucks which haul fruits and vegetables to keep them from spoiling. It is also used to freeze blood for storage. Normally, it can only be kept for 21 days, but with liquid nitrogen blood can stored for up to one year, according to Zika.
