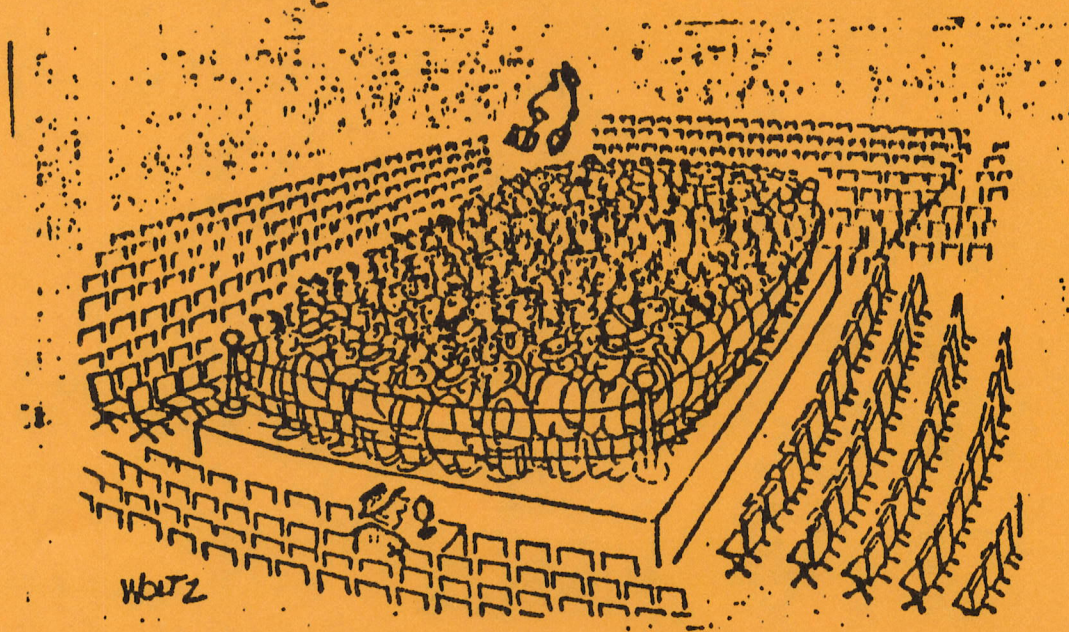
THE AMERICAN'S CREED

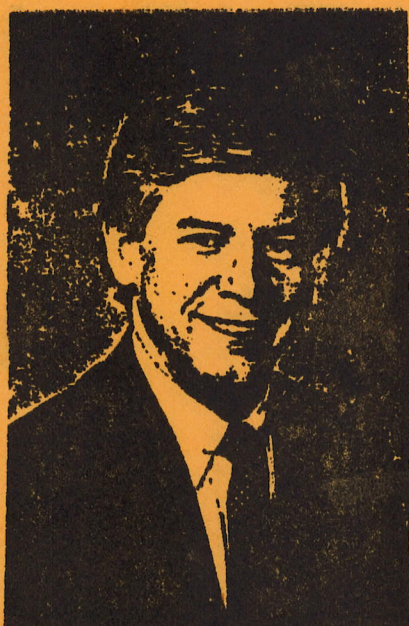
SENATOR BURDETTE SPEAKS AT EVENING ASSEMBLY

PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE, KEITH BURDETTE OPENED HIS TALK THIS EVENING BY SAYING THAT HE WAS DISAPPOINTED THAT THE GROUP WAS NOT MORE LIVELY. THIS STATEMENT RECEIVED A ROAR FROM THE CITIZENS.

SENATOR BURDETTE ASKED WHY SO MANY POLITICIANS COME TO MOUNTAINEER BOYS' STATE. THE SENATOR SAYS HE COMES BECAUSE THE CITIZENS OF BOYS' STATE ARE THE PEOPLE HE WILL SOMEDAY VOTE FOR. HE WANTS TO THINK THAT THE VISION OF THOSE WHO SUCCEED HIM WILL BE OF THE SAME INTEREST.

SEVERAL POINTS WERE OUTLINED FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF WEST VIRGINIA. HE WOULD LIKE TO SEE EDUCATION EXCEED THE NATIONAL AVERAGE & THAT ALL CAN GET A COLLEGE EDUCATION, WHETHER THEY CAN PAY OR NOT. SECONDLY, THAT 300,000 WEST VIRGINIANS WITH NO HEALTH INSURANCE CAN UNDERSTAND THAT IT IS A BASIC HUMAN RIGHT IN WV.

THE FIRST CRITERIA FOR MEETING THESE GOALS IS FOR ALL OF US TO BECOME MORE THAN WHAT WE ARE. HE QUOTED JOHN F. KENNEDY SAYING, "THE SUN DOESN'T ALWAYS SHINE IN WEST VIRGINIA, BUT THE PEOPLE ALWAYS DO."

KEITH BURDETTE (D) of Parkersburg, Wood County (3rd Dist.). Elected to the House of Delegates in 1978 and 1980. Elected to the Senate in 1982 and 1986. Senate Majority Leader, 69th Legislature. Elected September 12, 1989, as the 47th President of the Senate, succeeding Larry A. Tucker, who resigned September 7, 1989. 1989 Committees: Confirmations, Education, Energy, Industry and Mining, Finance, Government Organization, Rules, Ways and Means. Born April 27, 1955. Education: Parkersburg Community College; Glenville State College. Married July 27, 1985, to Margaret Smith of Charleston; son: Matthew Sheridan. Businessman. Member, Board of Directors, Western District Guidance Center; West Virginia Young Democrats; Parkersburg Area Jaycees; Fort Neal Kiwanis; Board of Directors, Parkersburg-Wood County Library.

II. TRUMAN CHAFIN (D) of Williamson, Mingo County (6th Dist.) Elected in 1982 and 1986. TRUMAN CHAFIN SPEAKS TO CITIZENS

SENATOR TRUMAN CHAFIN, MAJORITY LEADER, ADDRESSED THE CITIZENS AT THE EVENING ASSEMBLY. HE STATED THAT 170 BANKS CLOSED LAST YEAR, AND 470 WILL CLOSE THIS YEAR. THE SENATOR SAID THAT THIRD WORLD COUNTRIES HAVE ENGT(8) SOLDIERS FOR EVERY DOCTOR. THERE ARE 950 MILLION PEOPLE WHO ARE GOING HUNGRY IN THE YEAR THAT WE HAVE PRODUCED THE MOST FOOD. HE STATED THAT THESE ARE JUST NOTES ON TODAY'S NEWS AND SHOW THE COMPLEX PROBLEMS THAT THE YOUTH OF TODAY FACE.

HE ENCOURAGED ALL THE CITIZENS TO TAKE PART IN THE MOUNTAINEER BOYS' STATE PROGRAM AND TO SPREAD THE KNOWLEDGE THEY HAVE LEARNED THIS WEEK TO ALL PARTS OF THE STATE.

Dr. Robert Dillman, President of Fairmont College, spoke to the citizens of Boys' State during the noon meal on Tuesday, June 11, 1991.

Dr. Hillman is a native of Brooklyn, New York. He began teaching as a professional geologist. He later furthered his education at Penn State and Clark University. He is now serving as president of Fairmont State College where he has served for the past five years. He was previously president of Massachusetts State College for 21 years. He is involved in academic progress at Fairmont and is presently the academic part of the new FBI center and major aviation center between Fairmont and Clarksburg.

While at Boys' State, Dr. Dillman spoke to the citizens concerning the fact that West Virginia is now on the threshold of its greatest economic boom in its history...although it will be in areas of services and high tech and professional fields, instead of extractive industries of past years. He also advised them that for the first time in many years, it will now be realistic for them to stay in West Virginia after they are graduated from college.

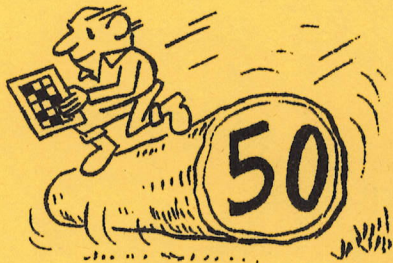

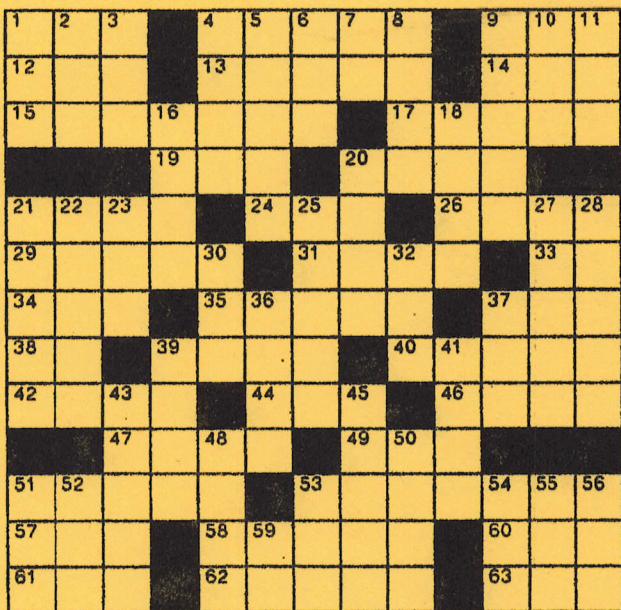

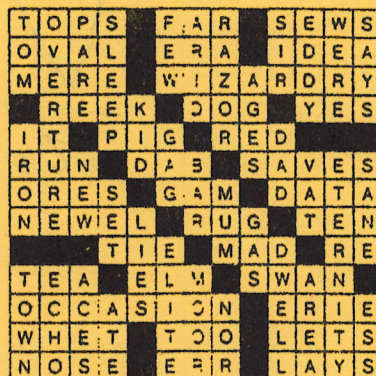
