
CLEVE BENEDICT ADDRESSES CITIZENS

West Virginia's Commissioner of Agriculture and Republican candidate for Governor in November, spoke to the Citizens at the evening meal. He gave some useful advice to the citizens regarding the development of leadership in their lives.

CLEVE BENEDICT (R) owns, and with his older son C. P., operates a dairy farm in Greenbrier County. Married to the former Ann Arthur, he is the father of two other grown children, Ruth and Pinckney, and has three grandchildren. Entered public life in 1971, when appointed chairman of the West Virginia Board of Probation and Parole. Subsequently served as Commissioner of Finance and Administration, and was a a member of the first State Farm Commission Elected in 1980 to represent the 22 counties of West Virginia's Second Congression at District. Wen appointment to the Harse Energy and Commerce Committee, where he served on the subsemmittees on Health and the Energy Conservation and Synthetic Frests, and Energy Conservation and Power. In 1983, named Deputy Assistant Secretary of the U. S. Department of Energy, where he served until his return to Greenbrier County in 1984. Elected Commissioner of the West Virginia Department of Agriculture in 1989, President of the Santhern Association of State Departments of Agriculture (SASDA). Holds a degree in bistory from Princeton University and is a graduate of the Grabam School for Cattlemen, Director of the State Fair of West Virginia, 1972-1978 Member of St. James Episcopal Church in Lewisburg, and is also active in Rotary and Ruritan.



CHIEF JUSTICE SPEAKS TO CITIZENS

Chief Justice of the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals, Thomas McHugh, spoke to the Citizens of Boys' State at the evening assembly.

He said that he came here to honor future leaders of the state. Everyone should be proud to be a west Virginian.

He gave two characteristics of the leaders: (1) leaders are going somewhere, and (2) a leader should be able to persuade others to go with them.

In contrasting winners vs. losers, he listed the following:

The winner is always part of the answer, the loser is always part of the problem.

The winner always has a program, the loser always has an excuse.

The winner says "Let me do it for you", the loser says, "That's not my job."

The winner sees an answer for every problem, the loser sees a problem for every answer.

The winner sees a green for every sand trap, the loser sees a sand trap for every green.

The winner says "It may be difficult, but it's possible; the loser says, "It may be possible, but it's difficult."

He was born in Charleston, West Virginia, March 26, 1936. Justice McHugh is a graduate of West Virginia University, A.B. Political Science, 1958, and served as 1st Lt. U.S. Army 1958-61, Infantry and Adjutant General Corps. Received law degree from West Virginia University College of Law, 1964; member of the Order of Coif legal honorary. In law school he was Associate Editor of the West Virginia Law Review. He served as law clerk to Judge Harlan Calhoun, West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals, 1966-68. President, West Virginia Judicial Association, 1981-82. He was elected Judge of the Circuit Court of Kanawha County in 1974 and re-elected in 1976; chosen by other judges in Circuit Court to serve as chief judge, 1974-80.

He and his wife, Judith, have four children: Karen, Cindy, James, and John.

ADJUTANT GENERAL SKAFF SPEAKS TO CITIZENS

General Skaff spoke to the Citizens of Boys' State at the noon meal on June 10, 1992. He was introduced by Trooper Lavinsky, a member of the Staff for this week. General Skaff was a former Boys' State citizen. He said, "Be active citizens within our state and within our nation." He also commended the American Legion for Boys' State program that has challenge and is meaningful. "Citizens of Boys' State are the future of our schools, communities, and nation."

Gen. MacArthur stressed "Duty, honor, country" to the West Point class in 1963. This is the code of our armed services.

Duty is dedication. To do service to our fellow man, to "be all that you can be."

Honor is a most sacred word in our language. We must take the harder right rather than the easier wrong.

Country - there is no greater honor than service to our nation. To fulfill this service: (1) pursue every educational advantage; (2) physical fitness builds physical and mental toughness to compete with the very best. Be sound in mind and body; (3) spiritual well being is attained by high ethics and standards to follow what is morally right.

In the Middle East we saw the value of Liberty and individual freedom. Those, clearly, do not come cheap. It makes us appreciate the value of being an American.

The attorney(s) representing the losing side in each civil case are required to file a Petition for Appeal with the Supreme Court by using the attached form. The opposing attorney(s) are also required to file a response to the Petition for Appeal by using the attached form. At the time scheduled above, the Supreme Court will convene and hear oral arguments in support of and against the Petitions for Appeal from the attorney(s) involved. The Supreme Court will subsequently advise the attorneys if the case will be accepted for appeal and will also advise them when to report to present arguments in support of their case.

All defense attorneys in criminal cases in which the defendant(s) was/were found guilty are required to file a Petition for Appeal with the Supreme Court according to the schedule above. The involved Prosecuting Attorneys will be required to file a response to the petition. An appeal will not be required, and is not permitted to be granted by law, in the case(s) where the defendant is found not guilty.

Law Lecture materials and the BOYS' STATE MANUAL contain information on types of cases the Supreme Court is permitted to hear on appeal and the grounds for the appeal (see page 101).

All attorneys involved in the appeal process are required to appear at the Supreme Court at the scheduled times, fully prepared to argue their case(s) before the court. Failure to do so may result in the attorney(s) arrest and subsequent prosecution for contempt of court charges.

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


