ATHLETIC PROGRAM GENERAL RULES

It will be the responsibility of the athletic representative of each county to insure that teams are fielded in accordance with the above schedule. It is of the utmost importance that the teams report to the correct area at the prescribed time. In the event a scheduled game is not played, the Athletic Director will determine if the game shall be classified as a cancellation or a forfeiture on the part of one team. The final team standing will be determined on a point system; all scheduled games being of equal value, regardless of sport. It will be necessary for the counselors to serve as referees and umpires where needed. RAIN OUTS OR POSTPONED GAMES WILL NOT BE MADE UP!

This trophy is awarded to the citizen of Mountaineer Boys' State who exhibits the qualities of having an enthusiastic interest in law and of high moral character with honor and respect and integrity for the rights of others. In addition, this young man must be an active participant in the programs of Mountaineer Boys' State. All citizens who have successfully passed the Mountaineer Boys' State Bar Exam will be considered for this award.

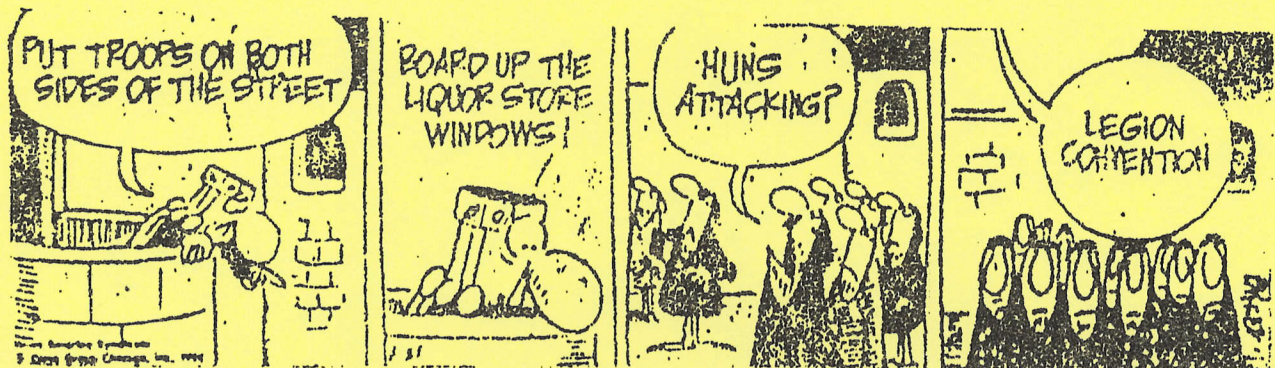
IV. WILLIAM R. FUGITT MEMORIAL TROPHY

GUEST SPEAKERS AT MBS ON SUNDAY, JUNE 6, 1993

CHIEF JUSTICE OF THE SUPREME COURT, MARGARET WORKMAN

Margaret Workman, Chief Justice of the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals, addressed the Citizens of MBS at the evening meal on Sunday, June 6, 1993. She spoke to the citizens about the Court Systems in West Virginia from the Magistrate level to the Supreme Court of Appeals.

She complimented the citizens for being chosen to attend MBS because of the great opportunity this program gives the citizens to learn more about state government which is the beginning of their education to come.

She spoke of the many vigorous campaigns she has encountered over the past years and expressed a desire to encounter some of these citizens in levels of government in the future.

Thanks for your participation, Justice Workman, and we invite you to be with us in the coming years.

MARGARET L. WORKMAN of Charleston, Kanawha County. Elected to the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals in November, 1988, becoming the first woman ever elected to a statewide office in West Virginia. Appointed in 1981 by Governor Rockefeller to an unexpired term of the Circuit Court of Kanawha County; elected to the remainder of the unexpired term in 1982 and to the full term in 1984; served on the Circuit Court for seven years. Prior to taking the bench, was engaged in private practice of law in Charleston, served as law clerk for the 13th Judicial Circuit, and was Assistant Counsel to the Majority of the United States Senate Public Works Committee. Born in Kanawha County, May 22, 1947. Education: West Virginia University and West Virginia University College of Law. Active in church and community activities, having helped form the Charleston Interdenominational Council on Social Concerns and the West Virginia Committee for the Prevention of Child Abuse. Episcopalian. Democrat. Married to Dr. Edward T. Gardner III; children: Lindsay E., Christopher W., and Edward E. Gardner.

JUSTICE OF THE SUPREME COURT, RICHARD NEELY

Justice Neely spoke of problems associated with the decline of family structure. This decline leads to the state having to assume the roles by providing needs that should be provided by the family. The medical budget of West Virginia now equals the cost of all elementary, secondary, and higher education in WV.

There is a need for change beginning with the way we view the problem, and the way we deal with the problems by being more responsible with our own lives and carrying that responsibility into our discussion with our peers.
