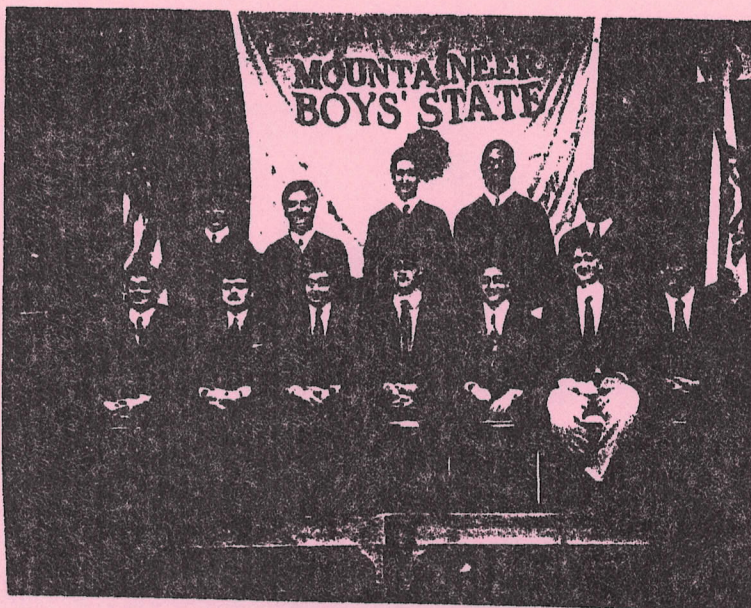

#### KARATE DEMONSTRATION AT EVENING ASSEMBLY

Brandon Craft, age 15, is the son of Mike and Helen Craft of Bloomingrose. He will be a sophomore at Sherman High School this coming year. He is an honor student, a member of the basketball team which had a record of 17-3, and was an All Boone-Lincoln Conference football player this year.

He began his study of Karate at age 7 and has been studying various martial arts for approximately 8 years. In 1987, Brandon was the 9 year old National Champion in point fighting. 1988 - captured two bronze medals in the USA Karate National championship at Caesars Palace, Las Vegas. 1989 - Silver medal winner in USA Karate National Championships held in Orlando, Florida. 1990 - Gold medal winner in USA Karate Nationalists held in Akron, Ohio (National Champion). 1990 - captured the gold medal in fighting in Budapest, Hungary, as a member of the USA Junior Boys Karate team and he is the current Junior World Champion in the 13 and 14 year old age division. 1990 - Gold medal winner in the 1990 Junior Olympics.

Brandon is a 2nd degree black belt in Karate and he is the only Caucasian in the United States under the age of 16 to hold a black belt in Aikido, which is a Japanese martial art. He is the holder of around 200 trophies and medals.

Other participants in tonight's Karate demonstration was Bill King, a teacher at Lewis County High School; Brandon Aragona, Attorney General of MBS, and three students: Bob Skinner, Mindy Green, and Chris Fortney.

GOVERNOR BLAIR BUSH  
JUNE 9, 1993

Administrator Stine, Former Governor Campbell, distinguished guests, family and friends. Today we begin a voyage, a voyage over the sea of opportunity. In a ship of unification to a land known as grace and prosperity. The ship is being commanded by no one man, but by the ideas and customs of the entire crew. This ship was built by no one man, but by you, the members of Boys' State.

I am proud to serve as your governor but even more proud of the people who got me here. I would like to thank my mother, father, and girlfriend who are all here today. However, I would really like to thank Brent Walker and Steve Redd.

As we begin our voyage let us keep in mind the tough times that will face us. One such obstacle we face is the importance of education. We must make the concept of equal opportunity the basis of our educational agenda. We must insure that the teachers who teach our children are ones who are worth forming the minds of tomorrow. At this time I would like to tell you about a woman by the name of Francis. Francis was born in the hills of West Virginia and at the early age of nine her father was killed in a farming accident. A year later her mother developed cancer and Francis was forced to quit school in order to take care of her. When Francis was twenty she married a man and had a son. The boy was mentally retarded and later her husband had a stroke which left him paralyzed from the neck down. Having no form of education or health care Francis was placed between a rock and a hard place. In order to care for her family she had to work 2 jobs, 7 days a week. Yet in all of this time, Francis was never seen without a smile on her face.

Many would say Francis was lazy, but I say she showed self sacrifice by giving up her chance at an education. Many would say that Francis was stupid because of lack of education, but I say Francis showed loyalty to her family. Many would say that Francis was all that was wrong with our state and country, but I say she exhibits all our country has to offer.

The voyage we are about to take is dedicated to people like Francis. People who work hard but are never allowed to live the American dream. Let us depart from shore and sail to our land of destiny.

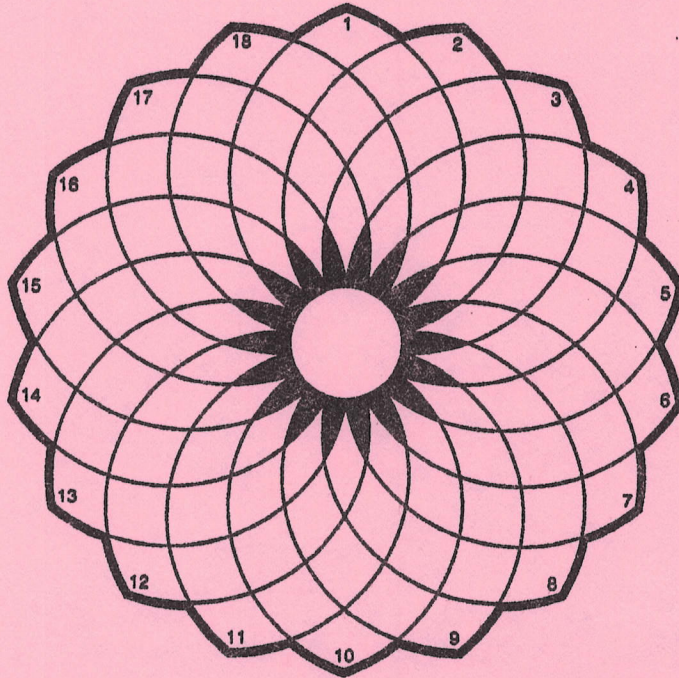
