JUDGE ROBERT EARL MAXWELL

Judge Maxwell is presently a Judge of the U.S. District Courts for the Northern District. Judge Maxwell spoke to the citizens at the evening assembly. He was well received by all Citizens and gave an inspiring message. Thank you for your contribution to Boys' State, Judge Maxwell.



ROBERT EARL MAXWELL (D) of Elkins, was born on March 15, 1924, the son of Earl L. Maxwell and Nellie E. Maxwell; educated in Randolph County Schools and Davis and Elkins College, LL.B. College of Law, West Virginia University in 1949; married Ann Marie Grabowski in March, 1948; four children, Mary Ann, Carol Lynn, Ellen Lindsay and Earl Wilson; commenced private practice of law in Randolph County, June 1, 1949; member of Randolph County Bar Association, the West Virginia State Bar, the West Virginia Bar Association, American Bar Association and American Judicature Society; Catholic; elected Prosecuting Attorney of Randolph County in 1952, reelected 1956 and 1960; appointed United States Attorney for the Northern District of West Virginia by President Kennedy on March 15, 1961, resigned January 31, 1964, to return to private practice; elected Delegate to Democratic National Conventions in 1956 and 1964; appointed by President Johnson on July 19, 1965, as Judge of the United States District Court for the Northern District of West Virginia; Past Member, Budget Committee of the Judicial Conference of the United States; Former President, District Judges' Association, Fourth Circuit; 1969 recipient Alumni Distinguished Service Award from Davis and Elkins College, 1979 recipient of Outstanding Community Leadership award of Religious Heritage of America, 1989 recipient of Order of Vandalia Award, West Virginia University, 1991 recipient of Merit Award, Davis and Elkins College Beta Alpha Beta; Appointed 1980 Judge, temporary Emergency Court of Appeals.

ADMINISTRATOR STINE HONORED FOR SERVING 35 YEARS WITH MBS

Bob first came to Mountaineer Boys' State as a staff member in June, 1958. He continued his yearly journey from Whitesville in Boone County to Jackson's Mill in Lewis County to serve on the Staff of Mountaineer Boys' State. He is a member of the Fraternal order of Masons and a Shriner.

As his wife, I was not allowed to get sick during that special week, and the birth of our first child was put on hold until the week at Jackson's Mill was finished. So, you see, he ranks his responsibility of being administrator very highly on his list.

At the evening assembly on Wednesday night, Bob was presented a plaque by Bob Wines in appreciation for his service and dedication to the MBS program. It will certainly have a special place on the wall of our home.

He is very appreciative of those who help him so faithfully. Without the help of many, the task would be impossible.

Bob is a graduate of Tyler County High School and Morris Harvey College (Now the University of Charleston.) We have two daughters: Betty Ann and Cindy. We have a dog named Morgan, and two grand-daughters: Hollie and Lindsey.

In addition to the beautiful plaque, he was presented a MBS jacket by Bill Johnson, Department Adjutant of the American Legion Department of West Virginia.

COLONEL THOMAS LEE KIRK ADDRESSES CITIZENS

Colonel Kirk enlisted in the WV State Police in 1974 and had moved through the ranks to the title he holds today, that of Superintendent of the WV State Police.

Colonel Kirk talked about the WV State Police; that it was a tightly knit family, having approximately 550 troopers in the State of WV. This is about the same number of citizens seated in the dining hall at the time of his speech. He stated that the State Police force in WV is understaffed and wants to raise the ranks to 600 troopers.

He wants to provide cadet classes in the future. The plan is to have specialty type divisions in the WV State Police; Bureau of criminal investigation, surveillance squad, sniper squad, aeronautical division and other divisions.

It is a true police agency we have in WV because they have authority to enforce all laws of the State of WV; unlike other agencies in other states which only enforce traffic laws.

Colonel Kirk commented that if he ever had the opportunity to review a cadet application to the police academy where the applicant indicated he was a former Boys' State Citizen, he would look upon that application in a favorable manner.

Colonel Kirk admitted that he was not a public speaker. He is a policeman, but welcomes the opportunity to come to speak to the citizens. He also made himself available for questions after dinner and invited them to inspect the helicopter.

Colonel Kirk has an impressive record. His professional experience and the training and education he has encountered is beyond reproach.

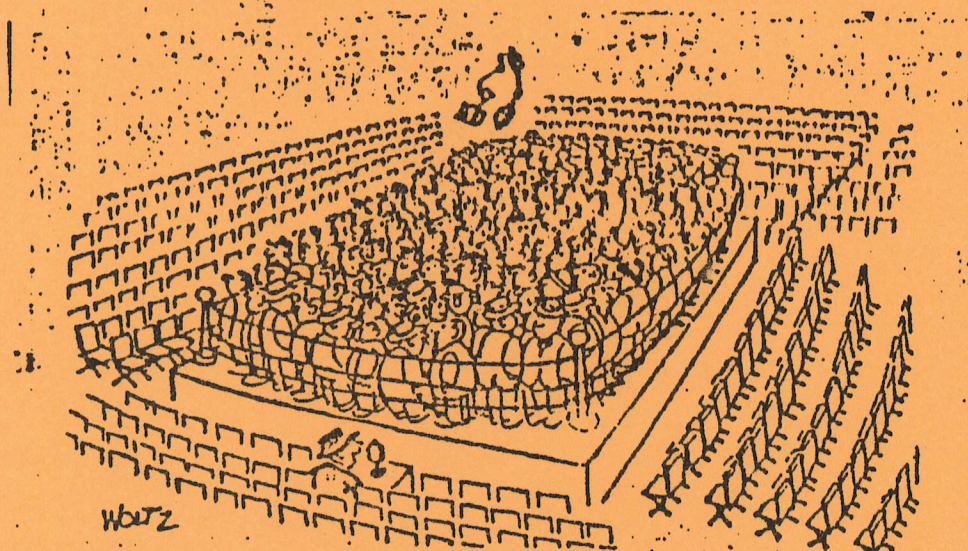

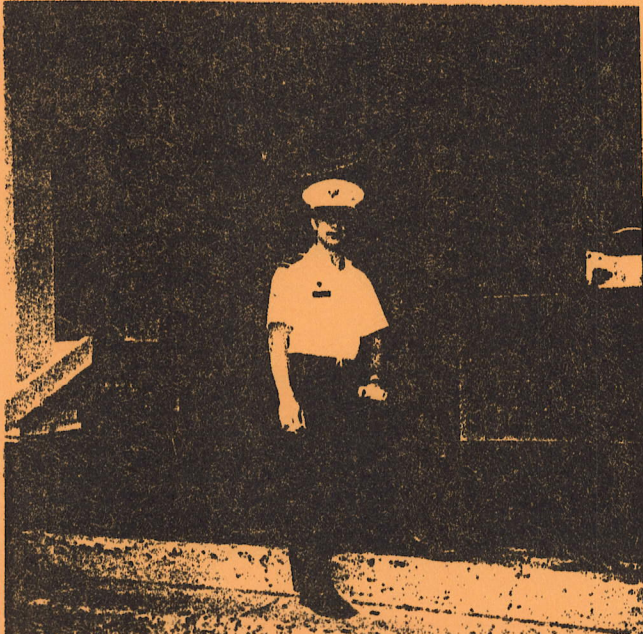

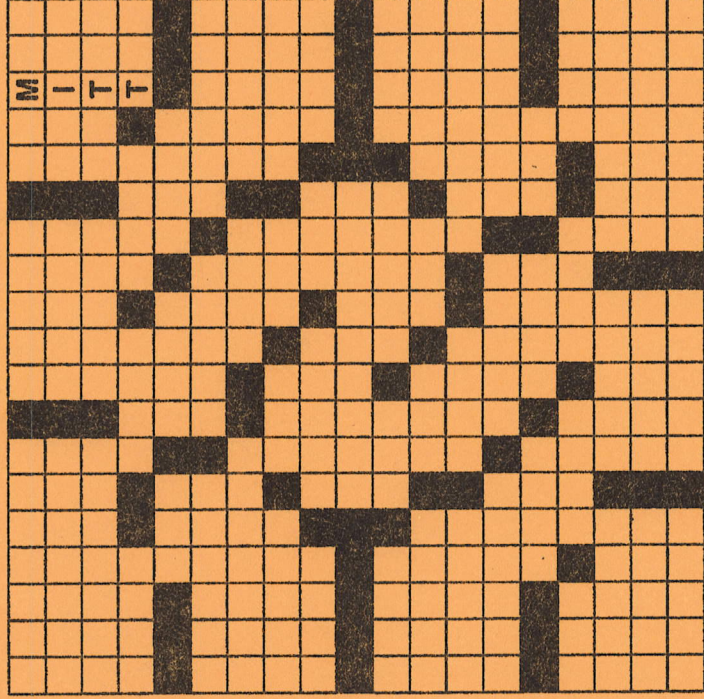
