# Karate teaches important disciplines, says two-time world champ

BLOOMING ROSE - By the time Brandon Craft was 12, he was a two-time world champion in the art of karate.

At 17, he is a martial arts instructor, plays football, basketball and maintains an academic average at the top of his class at Sherman High School.

His parents, Mike and Helen Craft, attribute much of their son's success to his involvment with martial arts.

"I don't think people realize how much disci-pline is involved," said Bob Stein, an official with Boys State, where Craft often gives kareat demonstrations.

Tall and athletic, Craft still finds karate to be a physically demanding sport as well.

"I have more injuries from karate than football. There are many aspects which are a lot harder than they look," Craft said.

"When he demonstrates what appear to be kicks and jabs, this expert is putting hundreds of small motions into action at once.

"Each move is learned one step at a time. That's part of the discipline. That's why someone who wants to learn karate needs to be willing to stick with it and learn how to do the moves correctly," Craft said.

His skills have taken him all over the United States and to competitions in several other countries.

"It's a real education in and of itself," said
Craft's mom. "He's learned about different cul-

"There's a great deal of mental preparation, and the whole focus of the martial arts teaches respect and responsibility."

Craft agrees.

"It's hard to get kids today to see that. In our classes we really stress the need for concentration and the mental part of it, but the kids come in wanting to learn how to kick and fight the way they see actors do that on TV," he said.

Students often find it hard to accept the teaching that one should make every effort to avoid a fight instead of becoming involved in one, he added.

"Learning to walk away from trouble is part of the discipline. We especially don't want kids out trying to start a fight just so they can show off their karate skills."

tures, their money exchanges, mannerisms, customs and even a little of their languages along the way."

Craft would love to see karate become a medal sport in the Olympics, especially while he would qualify to compete.

"It's not likely to happen in time for me, but I hope that someday it will be recognized on that level. It certainly deserves to be," Craft said.

Among the top juniors in the United States, Craft said karate has taught him to balance his goals and objectives in life.

He plans to go to college and major in physical

"I won't make karate my main goal, but it will always be a part of my life," he said.

James' presentation included, The Gettysburg Address, Great Moments with Mr. Lincoln, The Unknown Soldier (by Billy Rose), and The Proclamation of West Va. Statehood. The hat he wears in his portrayal of Lincoln was given to him 8 years ago by A. James Manchin when Mr. Manchin visited Boys' State and spoke to the citizens. James and Mr. Manchin once again shared the podium. He was assisted by some good friends, Mr. Art Zoechler, senior counselor of Panhandle Cottage and Miss Susie McClain, a 1995 graduate of West Liberty State College.

James lives in Triadelphia with his parents, Edward and Patty Daque. He graduated from Wheeling Park High School in 1988. He was a citizen of MBS in 1987 and returned for two consecutive years as a junior counselor in Panhandle Cottage where he was a

citizen in 1987. He now serves on headquarters staff.

He holds an AA degree from WV Northern Community College in Liberal Arts. He is a senior studying Interdisciplinary Studies, concentrating in American Studies at West Liberty State College. James will graduate in December 1995.

James portrays Lincoln in talent and variety shows, 4-H and other civic groups, and to schools in various areas of the state. He also presented his portrayal of Lincoln on February 12, 1992 to the West Virginia State Senate in Charleston. He was accompanied by the 1991 Boys' State Senate.

His comments about Boys' State: "I consider Boys' State to be one of the best programs I have had the opportunity to participate in because it permits the citizens to elect their

peers to public office and to meet their elected officials."

James was born with cerebral palsy. He said that this limits him somewhat; however, he can set a goal and eventually achieve We all need to learn a lesson from James. He has demonstrated his ability to rise above his disability throughout his life. In high school, he was a member of the National Honor Society and served as parliamentarian for Student Council. attends Roney's Point Presbyterian Church.

James has one younger brother, Jerry, who is an EMT and a graduate of Fairmont State College, where he studied biology.

We wish James well and look forward to his returning to Boys' State each year to help with the program. He has been a real asset to us here at Jackson's Mill.

# **FLAG ETIQUETTE**

Proper care and presentation of the flag are as important as what the flag means to American citizens.

However, some citizens and businesses display the flag in an incorrect fashion.

The tattered flag located at the newly renovated Tax Revenue Center at 1001 Lee

St. E. is an example, ac-cording to the Federal Flag Code, a code that outlines proper etiquette for display of the flag.

Jim Paige, secretary of tax and revenue, said a new flag has been or-dered for the building.

"This flag has been up since 1986. Within the next week, a new one will be put up," he said.

Here are some dos and don'ts on flag care and etiquette that are listed in the Federal Flag Code:

The flag should be displayed from sunrise to sunset. If displayed after sunset, a light must shine on it. The flag should be raised briskly and lowered slowly, and an all-weather flag is necessary in bad weather.

The flag should be flown on designated days of historic meaning, such as the Fourth of July. However, it may be flown every day of the year. It also needs to be flown at all public buildings, where people vote on Election Day and when school is in session.

A badly soiled, faded or torn flag should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning. This type of burning is not desecration of the flag.

Flags should never be flown upside down unless of "a dire emergency" and it should never touch the ground.

The flag should never be carried flat or have items carried on it. It should always be free floating and aloft. It also should never be used as clothing or a uniform.

Groups may wear flag patches on a uniform, if they are worn in accordance with the

flag code. A button or pin depicting the American flag may be worn as a demonstration of patriotism.

Storage of the flag should be in a place where it cannot be soiled or damaged. The flag should not be drawn or marked on. used as drapery or drawn back in folds. The flag should not be used as a ceiling or table cloth or used for advertising purposes. to replace the worn U.S. flag flag to half-staff on the Tax Revenue Center on Veterans or Raising the

Armistice Day is incorrect. This day is set aside to honor veterans, not mourn them.

When flying on a single flagstaff, along with another flag, the American flag must fly at the top. This assures it will be raised first and lowered last. On special days, it may be flown at half-staff. On Memorial Day, it should be flown at halfstaff until noon, then raised to the top of the flag pole.

Hanging vertically, the union (blue area with 50 stars) should be in the upper left corner. Against a wall, it should be at the top to the flag's own

If the flag is mounted on a staff, the American flag should be to the right of the speaker and to the left of those looking at it. When displayed at the speaker's platform, it must be above and behind the speaker.


