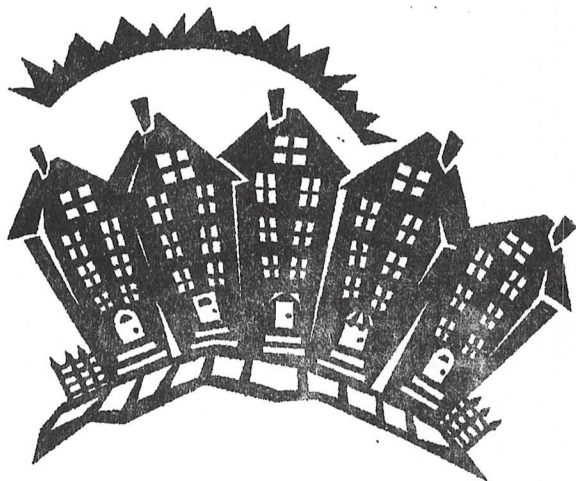

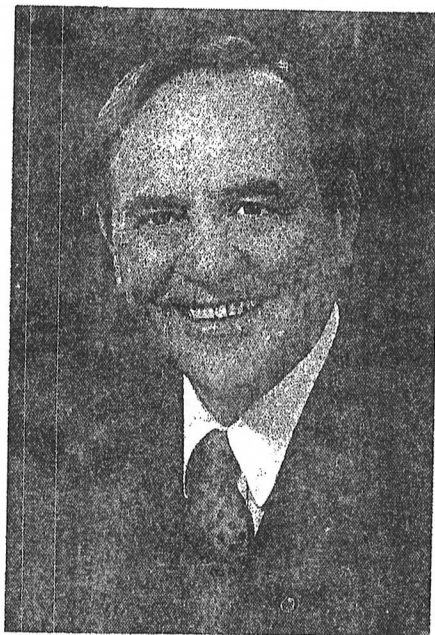

LARRIE BAILEY SPEAKS TO CITIZENS OF MBS

Larrie Bailey, State Treasurer, spoke to the citizens of Boys' State at the noon meal. Mr. Bailey was introduced by Steve Sluss, a Boys' State staff member. Mr. Bailey was first elected State Treasurer in 1976 and has held that office for many terms. He has also run for Congress and Governor of WV. He was a Boys' Stater in 1951. He later joined the navy. Mr. Bailey stressed that Boys' State is a camp for a chosen group. He also encouraged all citizens to live their lives to the fullest. In conclusion, Mr. Bailey stated, "God speed is your effort to achieve." He was awarded a certificate of appreciation for speaking to the citizens of Mountaineer Boys' State.

LARRIE BAILEY (D) of Fairmont, Marion County. Elected Treasurer of West Virginia in 1976, 1980, 1990 and 1992. Elected to the West Virginia House of Delegates in 1960; 1964 Democratic nominee for First Congressional District; 1968 ran in Democratic primary for House of Representatives. Born March 2, 1934, in Weston. Education: University of South Carolina (BA); West Virginia University (MA), political science. Married to the former Joyce Kennedy; three children: John, a graduate of Yale University and West Virginia University College of Law; David, a graduate of George Washington University; and Anne, a student at West Virginia University. Former Professor, Fairmont State. Member, Phi Kappa Sigma.



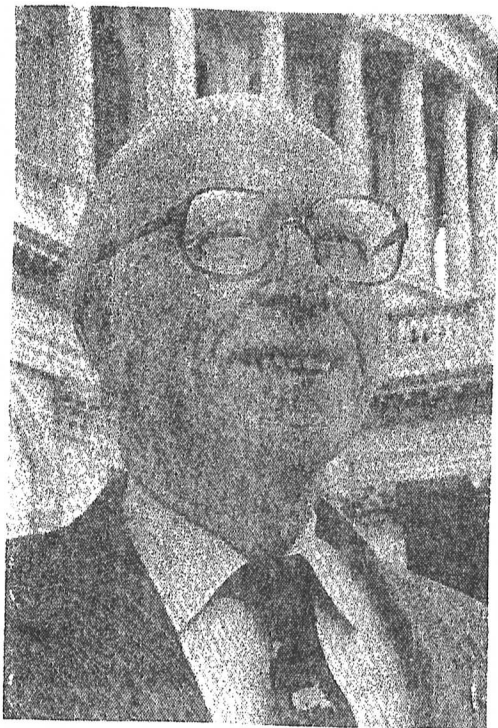
Will Smith, Camp Reporter

SECRETARY OF STATE

West Virginia's Secretary of State, Ken Hechler, sang for his supper Monday night, educating and entertaining the citizens and staff of Mountaineer Boys' State with his song concerning the tax system in West Virginia. Listen for Ken's next hit on Casey Kasem's American Top 40!

Secretary Hechler has one of the longest and most successful political track records in West Virginia history, having served several years as Congressman and is now in his second term as Secretary of State.

Secretary Hechler is a veteran of World War II and is the author of The Bridge at Remagen, the true story of the Allies's first crossing of the Rhine River into the interior of Germany, which signalled the beginning of the end for Hitler's Nazi regime. The book was later made into a film by the same name.

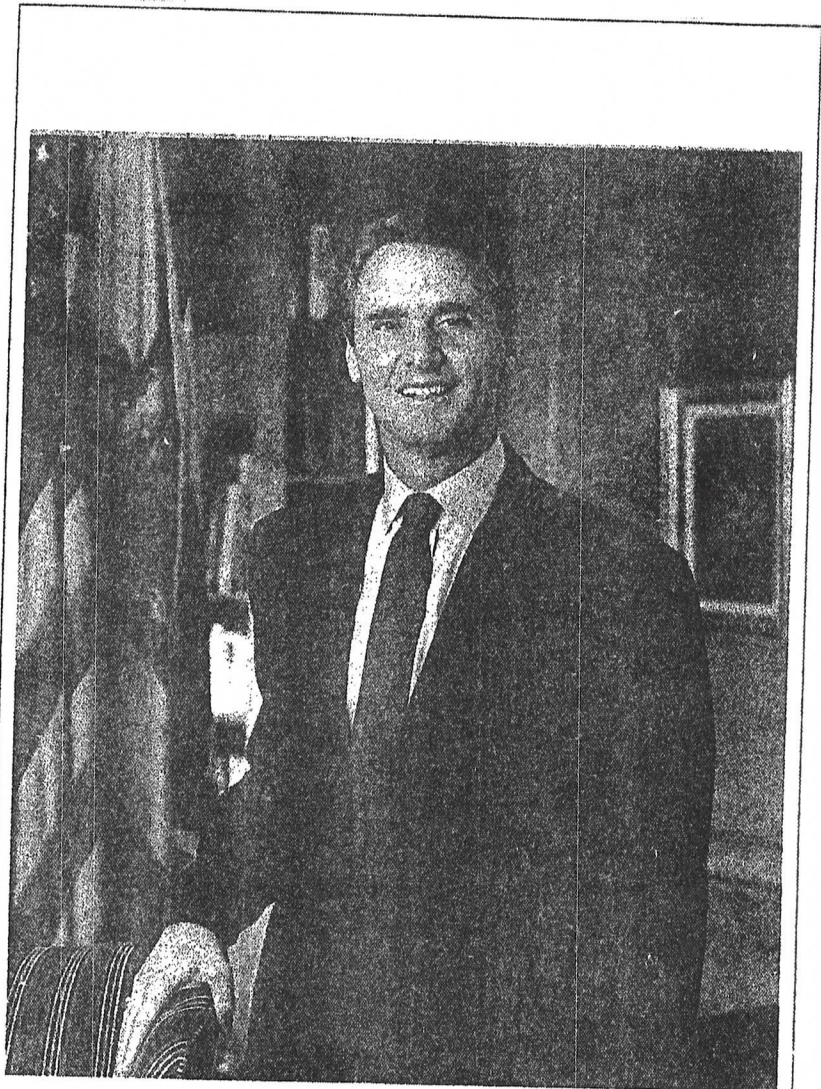
Secretary Hechler spoke Monday about the need for young people to get involved and remain involved in the political process back in their home counties. He encouraged Boys' Staters to not only learn the mechanics and strategy of electioneering, but also to commit themselves to an understanding of the principles of justice and freedom --two of the hallmarks of American democracy.

GOVERNOR CAPERTON ADDRESSES CITIZENS

Governor Gaston Caperton spoke to the citizens of Mountaineer Boys' State after the noon meal. He was introduced by Brent Walker, 1980 Boys' State Governor. Governor Caperton thanked the sponsors and staff of Boys' State. He spoke about Homecoming '96 as an opportunity to attract people back to West Virginia. He gave advice on how to become a great leader. *"To be a great leader you have to have a dream and hold on to it, get a strategy, set a goal, and have personal principles."* He informed everyone of the successful opening of the Tamarack which is an arts and crafts center in Beckley, WV.

Governor Caperton presented a National Math Award to Andy Grimm, Gilmer Cottage. Governor Caperton concluded by quoting Andrew Carnegie. *"What the mind can achieve, the heart can believe, the person can achieve."*

Governor of West Virginia

GASTON CAPERTON (D) of Charleston, Kanawha County, West Virginia's 31st governor. Elected Governor in 1988, his first attempt to seek public office, and reelected in 1992. During the previous 20 years, Caperton built a small, family-owned insurance firm into one of the nation's largest insurance brokerage firms. Elected June 1991 chairman of the Southern Regional Education Board. Elected chair of the Southern Governors' Association's Corporate Coalition to Improve Maternal and Child Health. Awarded in June 1991 the first annual West Virginia Trial Lawyers Association "Fred Caplan Award". Elected in 1991 chair of the Southern Growth Policies Board, a regional economic development consortium. Elected the National Governors' Association Work Force Development Task Force in 1992. Elected August 1993 to the executive committee of the National Governors' Association and the executive committee of the Democratic Governors' Association and reelected in 1994. Chaired the Interstate Oil and Gas Compact Commission in 1994. Elected Chairman of the Democratic Governors' Association in 1995. Born February 21, 1940, attended Kanawha County public schools and graduated from Episcopal High School in Alexandria, Virginia. He earned his Bachelor's degree in Business from the University of North Carolina and holds honorary degrees from Marshall University, Bethany College and West Virginia State College. Married to Rachael Worby, maestra of the Wheeling Symphony Orchestra. Father of two sons, Gat and John.

Captain Terry Snodgrass Speaks to the Citizens of MBS

Captain Terry Snodgrass, Dept. of Public Safety, spoke to the citizens of Mountaineer Boys' State after the noon meal. The State Police consists of 507 members of which Terry's son is the youngest. BAR EXAM RESULTS

On Sunday, June 8, 1996, Boy's State Legal Advisors Randall K. Kocsis and Steve Sluss delivered the annual Mountaineer Boy's State Law Lecture. Immediately after the lecture, the Boy's State citizens took the Bar Examination. A make-up exam was given on Monday morning. The examination was graded per the provisions of the 19th Amendment to the Mountaineer Boy's State Constitution.

A total of 364 citizens took the 1996 Bar Examination. One hundred and thirty four citizens passed the Bar Exam by scoring 76% or better. The average score was 70.93%.

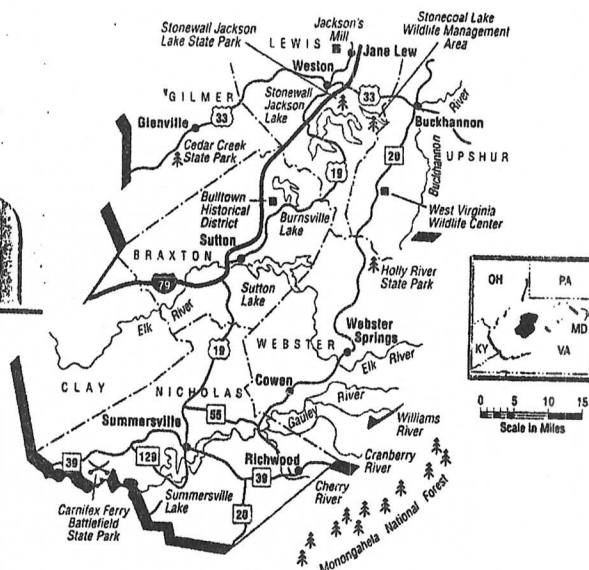
The highest scores were made by Dominic J. Ashby (Panhandle) and Bradley Plantin (Calhoun). They each scored 96% on the test. The second highest score was 94% and was earned by Michael Grimes (Marion), Nicholas Doner (Panhandle), R. J. Nestor (Randolph), and Andrew S. Miller (Upshur). Congratulations to everyone who passed the test.

All citizens who passed the Bar Exam must take the Attorney's oath in the Boy's State Supreme Court before they can lawfully practice law at Boy's State. The Boy's State Supreme Court will be open for business on Wednesday morning.

Mountain Lakes



T

he luxuries here are forested mountains, sparkling lakes, rivers and streams, crystal clear skies and starry mountain nights.

What will you have? Whitewater? Boating and fishing? Hunting? Or, just the great

If there is a purist's West Virginia, the Mountain Lakes region is arguably it. You'll find no flashy monuments or shopping malls and hardly any neon.

outdoors, served up with beauty and serenity? There's Civil War history, too, at Stonewall Jackson's boyhood home and Carnifex

Ferry Battlefield State Park. But, most of all, there's the great outdoors, unchanged, unspoiled and majestic, ready to enjoy.

Weston's Roots

The Jackson family was prominent in the area and Stonewall's grandfather planned the community of Weston in 1818. It first grew as a center of commerce on the east/west Staunton to Parkersburg Turnpike, now U.S. 33, and boomed shortly before the Civil War when oil and gas were discovered nearby. The town's post-war prosperity is evidenced in its ornate late Victorian architecture. During the winter holidays, Weston becomes *Christmas Town*, with dazzling downtown streets draped with lights and displays.

Records held in Weston's Central West Virginia Genealogical and Historical Library prove that the surrounding hills have a longer history than the town. Genealogists from far and wide come to the library in search of records of the region's 18th century settlers, who later dispersed across the nation. The library is a preservation project of the national membership of Hacker's Creek Pioneer Descendants.

Local Color at Jackson's Mill

You don't have to be an outdoor warrior to enjoy the Mountain Lakes region. Come for its history, for its many celebrations of traditional culture or to simply relax among the natives.

One of the bastions of Mountain Lakes culture is not a town at all, but an old farm off U.S. 19 north of Weston in Lewis County. Confederate General Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson grew up at Jackson's Mill, his family's ancestral home. In the 1920s, the farm became the nation's first 4-H campground. Today, Jackson's Mill is a year-round conference center, an historical district featuring buildings and collections of local artifacts and host to the annual Labor Day weekend *Stonewall Jackson Jubilee*, one of the state's largest and best festivals of traditional arts.

Visitors to the historic area will see the mill, now a museum, where young Tom Jackson worked; the Blaker Mill which grinds locally grown grains used in the center's kitchen; and on the site where the Jackson home once stood, the 1793 McWhorter Cabin. The new visitor's center and gift shop is a 150 year old square hewn, double-pen log house, the Mary Conrad Cabin, typical of dwellings built in the region during the time of the Civil War.
