

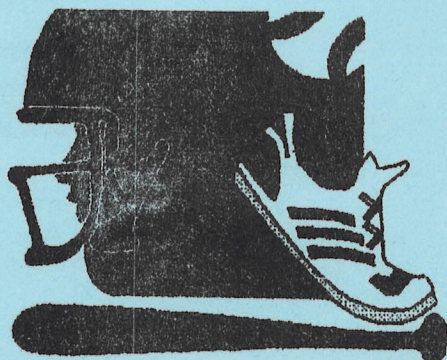

## THE AMERICAN'S CREED

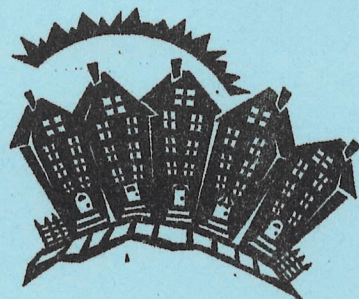

The attorney(s) representing the losing side in each civil case are required to file a Petition for Appeal with the Supreme Court by using the attached form. The opposing attorney(s) are also required to file a response to the Petition for Appeal by using the attached form. At the time scheduled above, the Supreme Court will convene and hear oral arguments in support of and against the Petitions for Appeal from the attorney(s) involved. The Supreme Court will subsequently advise the attorneys if the case will be accepted for appeal and will also advise them when to report to present arguments in support of their case.

All defense attorneys in criminal cases in which the defendant(s) was/were found guilty are required to file a Petition for Appeal with the Supreme Court according to the schedule above. The involved Prosecuting Attorneys will be required to file a response to the petition. An appeal will not be required, and is not permitted to be granted by law, in the case(s) where the defendant is found not guilty.

Law Lecture materials and the BOYS' STATE MANUAL contain information on types of cases the Supreme Court is permitted to hear on appeal and the grounds for the appeal (see page 101).

All attorneys involved in the appeal process are required to appear at the Supreme Court at the scheduled times, fully prepared to argue their case(s) before the court. Failure to do so may result in the attorney(s) arrest and subsequent prosecution for contempt of court charges.

### JUDGE FRED L. FOX II

Judge Fred L. Fox II swore in the newly elected officials at the 59th Inauguration. Judge Fox complemented the band on an outstanding job. He also stated that this was the first time he had gotten a standing ovation from the citizens. He gave excellent advice by stating, "Great deeds are done by men of great character." He concluded by saying that is an honor to be elected to any office.

## PRESIDENT ABRAHAM LINCOLN MAKES APPEARANCE AT MBS

On Wednesday, June 12, 1996, an excellent portrayal of Abraham Lincoln was presented to the citizens at the evening assembly. The portrayal was presented by James E. Dague, and the audience was spellbound at James' presentation. James' presentation included, The Gettysburg Address, Great Moments with Mr. Lincoln, The Unknown Soldier (by Billy Rose), and The Proclamation of West Va. Statehood. He holds an AA degree from WV Northern Community College in Liberal Arts. He graduated in December, 1995 from West Liberty State College with a degree in Interdisciplinary Studies, with a concentration in American Studies.

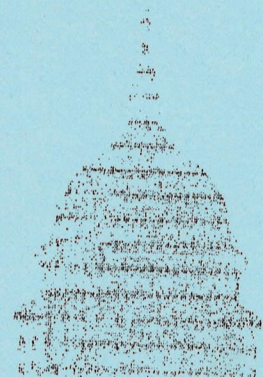
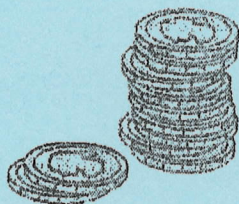
James portrays Lincoln in talent and variety shows, 4-H and other civic groups, and to schools in various areas of the state. He also presented his portrayal of Lincoln on February 12, 1992 to the West Virginia State Senate in Charleston. He was accompanied by the 1991 Boys' State Senate.

He attends Roney's Point Presbyterian Church.

James has one younger brother, Jerry, who is an EMT and a graduate of Fairmont State College. He is now a medical school student in Mexico.

We wish James well and look forward to his returning to Boys' State each year to help with the program. He has been a real asset to us here at Jackson's Mill.

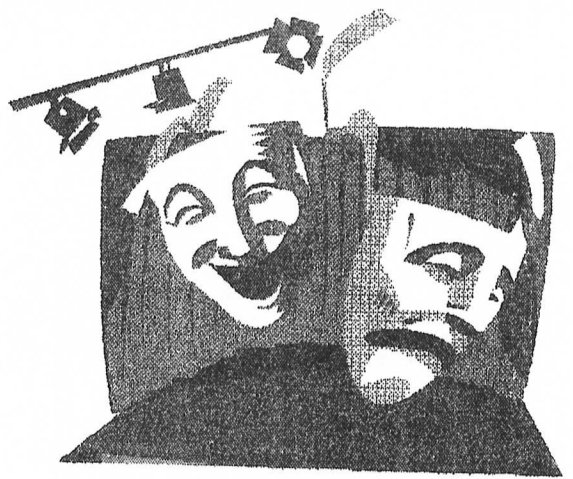




## MONROE COTTAGE NEWS

# Mountaineer Country

**F**ineteenth century pioneer forts bring to life the harsh realities of the nation's push west. A covered bridge in the small town of Philippi marks the site of the first land battle of the Civil War. In towns and cities around the region, the legacy of nineteenth and twentieth

century waves of European immigrants who came to mine the coal, lay the railroads, cut the timber and build vast factories

remains. Their history, arts, customs and cuisines are all part of the fabric of life in Mountaineer Country.

The latest pioneers came in the late 1960s, ready to enjoy the land itself—mountain bikers, hikers, rafters, rock climbers and nature lovers who continue to explore and enjoy the mountains, rivers, lakes and trails of this region.

## Going to Town

Urban settlement began early on, as well. The Morgan family, credited with being the first Europeans to settle Western Virginia, moved across the mountains to establish roots in what is now Morgantown. By 1785, the town was chartered and functioning as a county seat.

Today, Morgantown is best known as the home of West Virginia University. When the WVU Mountaineers play at home in the fall, the state's attention is riveted on the 70,000 seat Mountaineer Field. In the winter, the WVU Coliseum attracts basketball worshippers.

A full calendar of cultural events and activities at the Mountainlair and the Creative Arts Center serve the university community and visitors as well. The Creative Arts Center is home to West Virginia Public Theatre, producing a series of Broadway favorites and popular performances each summer. For a taste of old-time culture, visit the 19th century Cook-Hayman Pharmacy Museum on the WVU Medical Center grounds.

The University also is a destination for meetings and conventions. WVU maintains a fully staffed conference center providing full support services for meetings up to 1,400.

To view a piece of the high tech side of Morgantown, take a ride on WVU's computer-operated Personal Rapid Transit System or PRT. A U.S. Department of Transportation research project operating since 1975, it provides daily transportation for students and residents, alike.

Most of Morgantown's downtown action resides on or near High Street. The past can be seen at the 1795 Old Stone House, a tiny structure on Chestnut Street, whose past included turns as a tavern, tannery, church and home, and now a craft and gift shop.

There are still Mediterranean arches and wrought iron balconies reminiscent of the region's 19th century ethnic ties. But, thoroughly modern tastes in music and food support a variety of pubs, bistros, interesting shops and bookstores. One of the newest attractions is the West Virginia Brewing Company, the state's only brewery pub, complete with atmosphere and one-of-a-kind brews.

## The Pioneer Spirit

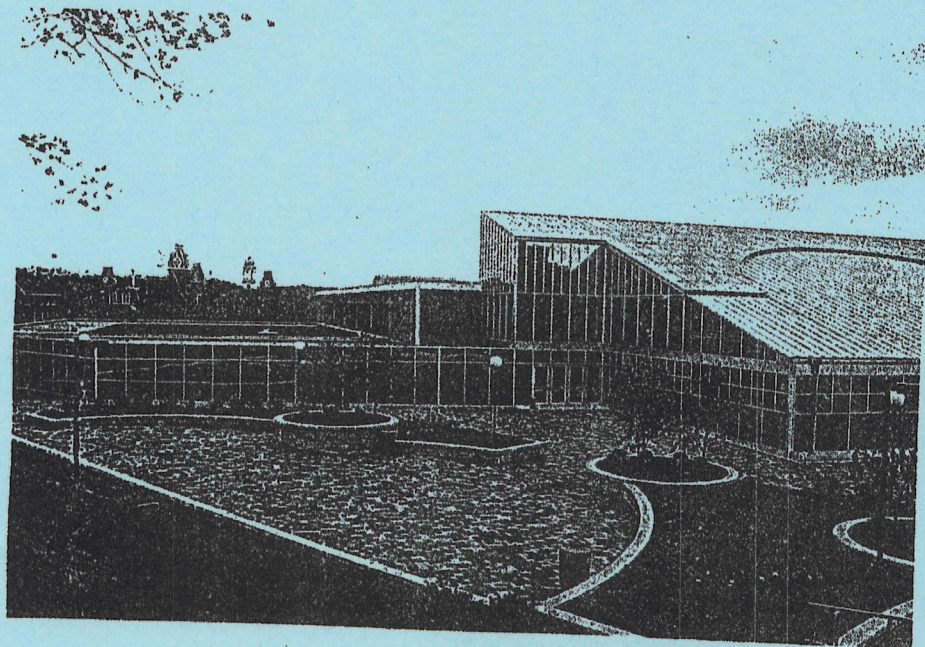
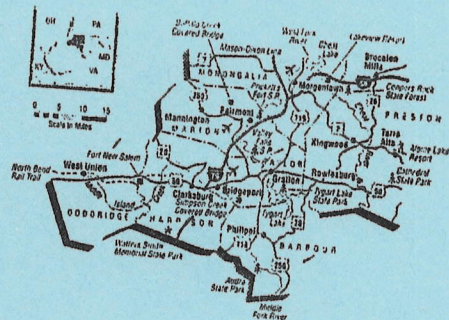
Starting at the beginning in Mountaineer Country means a trip backward in time to the pioneer-era forts that recreate life in the earliest settlements in the region.

The original Prickett's Fort, just off I-79 in Fairmont in Marion County, was established in about 1754. Reconstructed according to family diaries on its actual site, this 18th century civilian fortress, which protected homesteading families from the wrath of displaced Native Americans, is now a state park.

Fort New Salem, west of Clarksburg on U.S. 50 in Harrison County, is a collection of authentic 18th and 19th century log build-

ings collected from around the region, several of them outfitted with their original glass and hardware fittings. Salem-Teikyo University offers Appalachian heritage arts classes at the Fort.

At Watters Smith State Park, an eighteenth century agrarian homestead in southern Harrison County, the trials and victories of early farm life are evident.

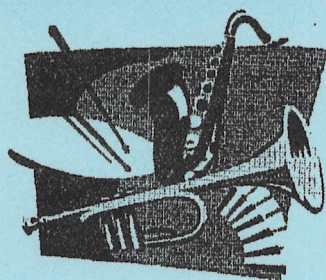


**Frontier life** unfolds during the outdoor drama at Prickett's Fort; on West Virginia University's campus, they're moving towards the future.

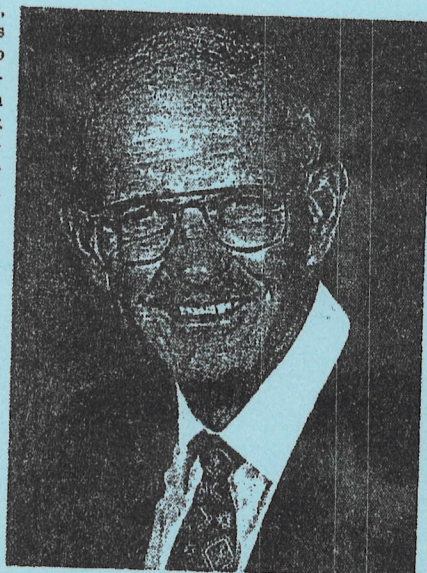

Was state and national President of Future Farmers of America, West Virginia Star Farmer, first president of the National FFA Alumni Association. Chairs the Southern United States Trade Association, Interstate Pest Control Coalition and State Soil Conservation Committee. Member, West Virginia Housing Development Fund and West Virginia Rural Development Council. Director for the Citizens National Bank in Point Pleasant and trustee for Pleasant Valley Hospital. Member of the board, State Farm Museum and director, State Fair of West Virginia. Served more than twenty-five boards, commissions and committees; chaired West Virginia Air Pollution Control Commission and the State Forestry Commission. He and wife Anna Lee have four children and belong to the Leon Baptist Church, Mason and Shriner.
