GLEN GAINER, STATE AUDITOR,
SPEAKS TO THE CITIZENS OF BOYS' STATE

Auditor Gainer described the importance of Boys' State and encouraged all citizens to use what they learn here in society. He also gave a description of his job which is to make sure tax dollars are spent accordingly with the law and wishes of the legislature.

State Auditor Glen B. Gainer III

Glen B. Gainer III of Parkersburg, Wood County, West Virginia, was elected West Virginia's 19th State Auditor in November of 1992, and re-elected in November of 1996. He was educated in the Wood County public school system, graduating from Parkersburg High School in 1978. He earned his Bachelor's Degree in Political Science at the University of Charleston, and attended the Washington Center for Learning.

Auditor Gainer served in the West Virginia State Treasurer's Office from 1985 through 1989; served as Budget Director for the West Virginia Department of Energy from 1989 through 1991; and served as National Accounts Representative for the John Deere & Company from October, 1991 through December, 1992. He is married and has two children.

As Securities Commissioner, ex officio, he approves, rejects, issues licenses for, and supervises the sale of securities in West Virginia.

As Commissioner of Delinquent and Nonentered Lands, ex officio, Mr. Gainer is responsible for maintaining records of land forfeited to State, land sold for delinquent taxes and redeemed.

As State Auditor, he serves as the State's official bookkeeper, audits all claims presented to the State for payment and, if found legal and correct, issues warrants therefor drawn on the Treasury. He administers Social Security for employees of State and political subdivisions. He also is responsible for receiving taxes due the State collected by sheriffs, and collects and distributes public utility taxes for the State and Counties.

Auditor Gainer serves as the Southeastern States Director, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Directors, and Chairman of the 2002 Committee of the National White Collar Crime Center. He serves as Vice-Chairman of the Consolidated Public Retirement Board. He serves as a Trustee on the West Virginia Investment Management Board and serves as Chairman of its Audit Committee. He also serves as a member of the Board of Public Works, Armory Board and Board of Trustees, State Municipal Bond Commission, Land Sales and Condominiums. Additionally, Auditor Gainer is active on several civic and fraternal organizations.

NEWS FROM THE OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR

Governor Major Newsome (F-Braxton), began his term as the 60th Governor of Mountaineer Boys' State with a full slate of bills to review. The Governor's agenda for tomorrow includes:

- Immunity Bill - gives the Governor, his staff, Senators, Delegates and Supreme Court Justices immunity for any misdemeanors.
- Hat Bill - allows citizens to wear hats around the campus during times that are not socially acceptable. Examples include: the raising and lowering of the flag, prayer, and during all indoor activities.

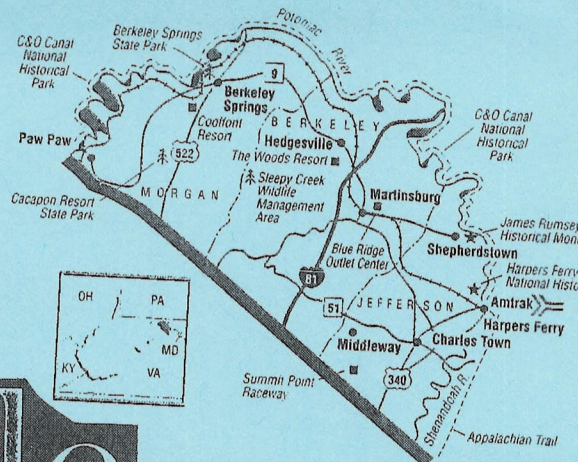
The Governor also hopes to have the Boys' State budget approved by the Legislature. Additionally, Senate Bill 104 was passed on June 11, 1997, by the Legislature and signed into law by the Governor. The law reads: "As the presentation comes to an end tonight, the citizens of Boys' State will be able to watch game 5 of the NBA Finals between the Utah Jazz and the Chicago Bulls. All of the students will be watching the games from one of many televisions throughout the Jackson's Mill Camp. There is still one point that must be clearly stated to all citizens. That statement is that no citizen will be allowed to leave the night's assembly."

Eastern Panhandle



T

here's captivating history with Colonial and Civil War roots; terrific shopping for antiques, crafts and contemporary housewares and clothing; dozens of lodging choices at resorts, spas, bed and breakfasts and motels; relax-

Just a stone's throw from the city, discover a quieter place where small, picturesque towns share the landscape with scenic rolling hills and farmlands. ation and adventure on the rivers, roads and golf courses; theater, cinema and fine dining, all within

the three county region known as West Virginia's Eastern Panhandle.

Bounded by the Potomac and Shenandoah rivers and about an hour from Washington, D.C. and Baltimore, the Eastern Panhandle, Jefferson, Berkeley and Morgan counties, is a natural escape from the Eastern metropolitan pressure-cooker.

Harpers Ferry's Civil War Roots

The town of Harpers Ferry is perhaps livelier today than it was in 1859, when abolitionist John Brown staged his raid on the U.S. Arsenal there, setting off a chain of events that resulted in the Civil War. It's undoubtedly more beautiful than ever before in its long history, as its historic section is polished and maintained as a national historical park.

The park is actually a collection of many small museums created within the original buildings. It offers a schedule of events all year long, with costumed interpreters providing daily tours throughout summer and on Saturdays and Sundays in fall, winter and spring.

Along the cobblestone streets winding uphill from the park to the town of Bolivar, shops feature a remarkable collection of antiques including Civil War memorabilia and local crafts. Shopping opportunities increase by some 200 juried booths during the popular June and September editions of the *Mountain*

where specialty shops, charming restaurants, small inns and the cultural programs of Shepherd College fill the town with visitors.

The Bavarian Inn and Lodge, overlooking the cliffs of the Potomac River, offers elegant rooms, as well as a swimming pool, lighted tennis courts, brand new conference facilities and award-winning German cuisine. The eclectic 1930s Yellow Brick Bank, The Olde Pharmacy Cafe, complete with original pharmaceutical trappings, and Ye Olde Sweet Shoppe offer historic settings and good food.

Art film buffs flock to the Old Opera House of Shepherdstown, recently refurbished as a cinema. Each July, Shepherd College's *Contemporary American Theater Festival* stages new works by both well known and novice playwrights and late night improvisational cabaret.

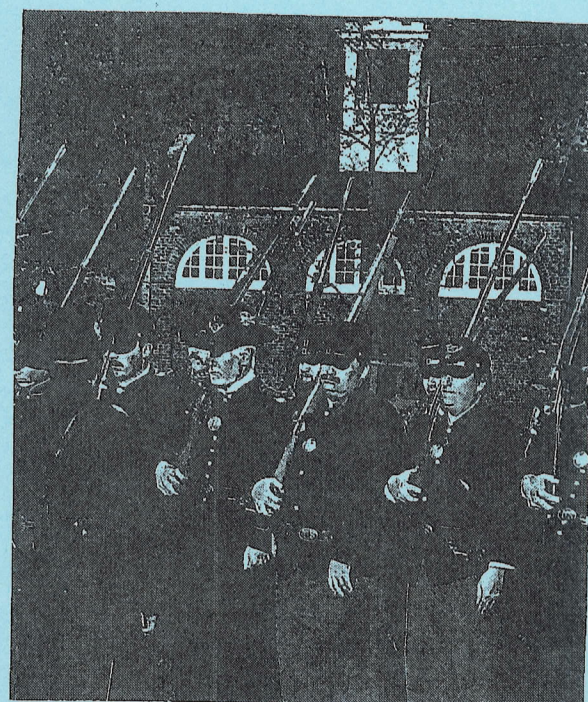
For a touch of history, visit Rumsey's Monument, along the banks of the Potomac. The site honors the town's most famous native, James Rumsey, who launched an early steamboat from this very spot.

Charles Town—Washington Family Roots

Charles Town, founded in 1786 and named for Charles Washington, George's brother, exudes 19th century charm and history. There are historic bed and breakfasts within walking distance of the town's attractions and fine dining at places such as the Washington House Inn. Other entertainment includes community theater, which thrives in the Old Opera House.

The white columned Jefferson County Courthouse became a national landmark when John Brown was tried in Charles Town in 1859. The Jefferson County Museum displays artifacts from the era, including the wagon that carried Brown to trial and the prosecutor's table.

Each April, owners and proprietors of historic properties throughout Berkeley and Jefferson counties open their doors for the annual *House and Garden Tour* that takes you to the historic villages of Colonial Middleway and Gerrardstown as well as Martinsburg, Charles Town, Shepherdstown and Harpers Ferry. You may get an opportunity to see the Washington family farmhouse outside of Charles Town where Dolly Payne married James Madison, second President of the United States.
