

Commissioner Douglass grew up amidst agriculture in Grimms Landing in Mason County, West Virginia. He was state and national president of the FFA and was chosen West Virginia Star Farmer and later helped to organize and served as first president of the National FFA Alumni Association.



New River Greenbrier Valley

Aghty rivers and breathtaking natural scenery are matched in splendor by world class hotels and cozy bed and breakfasts and inns. There are incredible state parks, adventures awaiting on the mild or wild whitewater of the region and hiking and biking on designated rails-to-trails or on the backroads and forests of your choice.

These ancient mountains and rivers tell the

Greenbrier Valley for nature at its most inspiring and civilization at its most refined.

tales of Native American lore; of natural springs which brought early visitors; of Colonial settlement and Civil

War battles; of the timber, the coal and the railroads which fueled turn-of-the-century prosperity; of historic cities, towns and celebrations.

Historic Lewisburg

Minutes west of White Sulphur Springs off I-64 is the lovely old town of Lewisburg, where dozens of shops and galleries inhabit a quaint collection of 18th and 19th century buildings, now designated as a National Historic District. The shops offer art, antiques, rare books, collectibles, gifts, fashions and accessories. There are a variety of inns, cafes and restaurants serving cuisine for the adventurous and the discerning. Lovely, historic bed and breakfast accommodations are found throughout the historic district.

At Lewisburg's own 1902 Carnegie Hall, a gift from steel magnate Andrew Carnegie, performers ranging from Isaac Stern to Asleep at the Wheel have graced the stage. A recently restored movie theater features live entertainment as well as popular films. In summer, the Greenbrier Valley Theatre Company produces shows in The Barn.

This August, a reenactment of the Battle of Dry Creek will be "fought" in the Greenbrier State Forest, between White Sulphur Springs and Lewisburg.

Another recent addition to this area is Swift Level, an upscale guest house with an accent on personalized service. Swift Level specializes in equestrian mountain trips and guided fly fishing and mountain biking excursions.

The Nation's River

North of Hinton, the New River takes on the waters of the Greenbrier River and plunges into a 1,000 foot deep gorge where 53 miles of its course is designated the New River Gorge National River.

The National Park Service operates two visitor's centers on the New River. The

Canyon Rim and Hinton visitor's centers have year round programs ranging from Sunday conversations with the region's old-timers to guided walking tours of the Gorge's historic communities to canoe safety clinics.

The Hinton Visitor's Center provides an orientation to the New River's southern reaches, including information on

the old railroad town of Hinton and scenic wonders such as Sandstone Falls.

More than a million visitors stop annually at the northern Canyon Rim Visitor's Center near the New River Gorge Bridge on U.S. 19 at Fayetteville. The center offers a stunning view of the New River Gorge and the world's longest steel arch bridge which spans it.

Over The Edge!

Crossing the gorge via the four lane New River Gorge Bridge is exhilarating enough for most. But a rare few take their excitement to another level at the annual *Bridge Day* celebration, as two lanes of the bridge are closed to vehicle traffic the third Saturday of October.

BASE jumpers fling themselves over the edge of the highest bridge east of the Mississippi and repellers dangle between the catwalks under the bridge with ropes in excess of 900 feet. For a safer thrill, join the

100,000 spectators who salute this engineering feat by enjoying the entertainment, craft and food booths which line the bridge's length for this single day each year.


Fun Down Below

The New River and its surroundings are home to the unusual in sports, sights and historical attractions.

The river is best known for its spectacular whitewater rafting and kayaking. But it also welcomes the less adventurous with gentle family whitewater float trips, canoeing on its upper reaches, tour boat cruising, interpretive history walks and excellent

smallmouth bass fishing.

The stretch below Cunard called the Lower New deserves its national reputation for major whitewater. More than 20 professional whitewater companies operate on the Lower New, guiding brave rafters through challenging Class IV and V rapids.



Watch the daredevils who head for the New

River on Bridge Day in October.

The upper New River reveals easy-going Class I, II and III rapids for a lilting scenic trip through backcountry teeming with egrets, herons, kingfishers, deer, bobcat and mink.

Sightseers who want a memorable New River experience should sign on for a jetboat tour from Hawks Nest to the New River Gorge Bridge. *Miss M. Rocks*, a 16 passenger canopied tour boat operated by New River Jet Boats, deftly maneuvers upriver for an optimum view.


