


FORMAL REVIEW 1998

First Boy's State

HE first Boy's State was held at Jackson's Mill

HE first Boy's State was held at Jackson's Mill from May 31 to June 6, 1936, over 52 years ago. Prior to this, arrangements were made for a maximum of 400 boys to attend this Mountaineer Boy's State Camp.

W. G. Stathers, of Clarksburg, was state commander of the American Legion, who was the sponsor. H. L. Card, of Springfield, Illinois, was the Dean of Councillors. Following conferences with Mr. Stathers, W. H. Kendrick, director of the Mill, R. Worth Shumaker of Buckhannon, and others, Mr. Card went to Charleston to study the State Government. The Camp was to be modeled after the state government. be modeled after the state government.

The camp was organized into nine counties and eighteen cities. Counties were Webster, Marion, Randolph, Monroe, Calhoun, Gilmer, Lewis, Harrison and Upshur. The cities were as follows: Webster Springs, Wheeling, Fairmont, Morgantown, Elkins, Keyser, Union, Huntington, Grantsville, Bluefield, Glenville, Beckley, Weston, Weirton, Clarksburg, Charleston, Buckhannon and Parkersburg.

There were two parties, in the Camp, the Nationalists and the Federalists. These parties held conventions and made nominations, just like the big boys do. Then, elections were held. The Nationalist party candidate for Governor was Leslie Reed, of Clarksburg. The Federalist candidate for Governor was Orin Conaway, of Paul Workman, Clendenin High School; Dr. R. H. Paden, Supt. West Va. Training School, St. Marys; Hollans Worth, Welch High School.

Elective officials of the Boy's State were sworn in by the real Governor, H. Guy Kump. Kump came to give a talk on how the West Virginia government operates.

Governor Kump told the Boy Staters to "Pay as you go — public debt, like private debt, must be paid. We do not wish to live at the expense of future generations — a government cannot support its citizens; the citizen must support its citizens, the citizen must support the government. No self-respecting citizen desires to have government do for him that which he could do for himself. Government is what citizenship makes it."



Holt, in com-pany of his wife, was entering the Camp, when newly appointed police officers stopped his car and gave him a ticket. He was charged with crossing a dangerous intersection without taking proper precaution. He retained Orin Conaway, of Sistersville, as his attorney, and posted two cigars, for bond. Conaway smoked the cigars and was attretted for destroying was arrested for destroying property held for possible county use. "Governor" Reed gave Holt a pardon. Holt later spoke to the Boy's State campers at an assembly time.





Boys State trains W.Va.'s leaders

The American Legion eaches people how o operate democracy

HE American Legion believes there is no better way to as-sure the survival of our republic than to train our young people in the ideals and objectives of American government and politics.

By teaching youth to understand und appreciate the basic principles avolved in the successful managenent of a democratic society, the organization believes we can keep unerica strong and ensure free-

lom for future generations.

These are the long-standing obectives of the popular American
egion Boys State, which is having
ts annual summer session this veek at Jackson's Mill. More than 00 young men have registered for he 61st anniversary of West Virjinia's camp.

Administrator Bob Stein of Whitesville said Boys State camps xist all over the United States, ut West Virginia's camp is the section of the s nd oldest in the nation, beat out nly by Illinois. "And that was only y about a year," said Stein, who as been involved with the camp

or 40 years.

The popular summer camp does ot emphasize classroom lectures or textbook learning. Rather, it emhasizes participation and person-

al experience in trying to operate a model state, complete with its gov-erning bodies and elected public officials.

Every Boys State operates under a two-party system, with instruc-tion provided in the organization and operation of political parties at different levels of government. Those attending get to participate in temporary roles as government

When the boys first arrive, Stein said, they are assigned to either the nationalist or federalist party. They each file for an office the first night and then have party caucuses the second night. Next comes an election.

The next day features a speech by the outgoing governor of Boys State. Then the new governor is sworn into office.

Next comes a legislative session by those elected at the camp. Some state officials and real legislators will visit Jackson's Mill this week

to assist in the process.

Stein said every boy attending the camp is elected or appointed to some public office either at the statewide or local level.

Rhododendron Girls State will also be held this month.

Many West Virginians who became active in local and state government got their first taste of politics by attending Boys State as teenagers.

stein said West Virginia Congressmen Bob Wise and Nick Rahall, who plan to visit the camp this week, both attended Boys State as teenagers. Hoppy Shores, a member of the Kanawha County Commission, attended Boys State

"In fact, Hoppy was my governor in 1949 at the camp," recalled Stein.

Wise says he has never forgotten

Boys State.
"That's where I lost my first campaign. I ran for governor there and didn't win," he said. "But I was really impressed with

the boy who beat me. I always remembered his statement that education is the only passport for poverty. In fact, I have applied that to my thinking ever since then.

"I try to go back every year, because it is one of the single most impressive experiences in my life," said the congressman. "It teaches said the congressman that the you how you can work within the system. We all came in as strangers, but became bonded by the end of the week."

Hoppy Shores also vividly remembers Boys State, though many years have passed.

"It was a great experience. It teaches you about county and state governments and why you should take part in them, even at a young

He recalled a sad note, though. "I went to the 50th anniversary of Boys State here and learned that 20 percent of our young governors elected at the camp had been killed in car wrecks. I was shocked.

"However, it inspired me to get involved with government and it did the same for many others," said Shores.

Gov. Cecil Underwood is scheduled to speak at the camp at 2 p.m. Thursday, said Stein.

Among those also scheduled to stop by the camp this week, he added, are West Virginia University President David Hardesty, state Auditor Glen Gainer III, Agriculture Commissioner Gus Douglass, state Treasurer John Perdue, Secretary of State Ken Hechler and U.S. Navy Admiral Joseph Lopez

Hats off to the American Legion for a constructive youth program that has survived for many years and has helped improve our state.

Former administrator, Tommy Jones, asked him to evaluate the instructional program. After this evaluation, he became the supervisor of this program and has since procured the


instructors for Boys' State.


Riffle concludes, "I really like the idea of helping people and my experience has been very rewarding. The friendships I've made here are ones I'll never forget."

ORTHERN PANHANDLE

Hub of the Panhandle

Wheeling is the historical and commercial hub of the Northern Panhandle. From its earliest days as a pre-Revolutionary outpost and stop along the National Road's path to the western frontier, to its 18th and 19th century role as a port of entry, through its boom and bust Victorian Era as the center of glass, steel and textiles. Wheeling has preserved and persevered.

Independence Hall in downtown Wheeling served as an 18th and 19th century customs house, as the capitol of the Restored Government of Western Virginia, and later as the state capitol for the new state of West Virginia. Today, it is a center for art and a showcase for the state's history, and is part of The Civil War Discovery Trail.

Mounds of Fun

Fifteen minutes south of Wheeling, Moundsville's first residents came early and left a monument to their culture whose longevity rivals any in antiquity.

In the region at least 15,000 years ago, the Adena culture's crowning achievement is the Grave Creek Mound. The largest conical burial mound in the Americas at 69 feet high and 900 feet in circumference at the base, it was built about 2,000 years ago from an estimat-

ed 60,000 tons of earth-about three million baskets full of dirt!

In Grave Mound State Park, adjacent to the burial mound, the Delf Norona Museum displays artifacts of the Adena period, about 1,000 BC to beyond 1 AD.


Moundsville is also iome to the famous

West Virginia Penitentiary, now closed o prisoners but open for tours. At the rison, constructed in the Civil War era, ou can witness what life was like for the nmates. In Alamo Cell Block, the worst f the inmates were housed 22 hours a ay. Elsewhere, inmates painted beautiil murals on the walls to help pass the

Wheeling is a country music destination. One of America's best known radio stations, WWVA, broadcasts Jamboree USA every weekend. The live show features top names and up-and-coming performers on the stage of the Capitol Music Hall.

The Capitol Music Hall also is home to the Wheeling Symphony. A highly acclaimed metropolitan class orchestra, the Symphony presents both classical and pops concert series, often with renowned classical, popular and jazz artists.

Just east of Moundsville lies Grand Vue Park, a family favorite. Amenities include golfing, a driving range, swimming, tennis, a playground, picnic sites, hiking trails and overnight accommoda-

Southeast of Moundsville, on a ridge just off US 250 at Limestone, the Palace

ugging the Ohio River, the sixcounty area of the Northern Panhandle remembers its history: the ancient Adena people who built a conical mound more than 2,000 years ago; the pioneer families and adventurers making their way west along the National Road; the boom that spawned extravagant Victorian homes in Wheeling and Sistersville.

Today, that history melds with the new Northern Panhandle, as exciting as those days long past, but now filled with the pleasures of today: great country music, wonderful family resorts and parks, outdoor adventure on the rivers, arts and culture, gracious dining and accommodations.

Sportsman's Paradise

Public hunting and fishing areas are easily accessible throughout the Northern Panhandle and are regularly stocked with bass, trout, northern pike and channel catfish. Wild geese and ducks flourish on the Ohio River and its tributaries. And while the fish and fowl are plentiful, the crowds are not.

If you're an angler, head to New Martinsville's Hannibal Locks & Dam and its public fishing pier on the Ohio River. The churning waters support an amazing variety of game fish. A paved access road and walkways accessible to people with disabilities make this spot perfect for a family fishing adventure.

The lush 9,229 acres of the Lewis Wetzel Wildlife Management Area are a paradise for sportsmen. Whitetail deer, wild turkey, a wide variety of small game and public campsites abound. Near

Middlebourne, Middle Island Creek offers canoeing, camping and fishing. More river than creek, it supports largemouth bass, channel catfish and other

Also nearby, the Jug and Conaway Lake Wildlife Management areas provide outstanding opportunities for anglers.



A. James served as West Virginia Secretary of State for 2 terms. He then was elected State Treasurer from which he retired. Manchin won the primary election for the House of Delegates from Marion County.

He is a patriot and a noted public speaker. He and his wife Stella live in Farmington in Marion County. They have several children and grandchildren.
