
2000 Boys' State Governor Patrick Knighton





MBS LEGISLATURE

If by some chance you don't know, the House of Representatives and the Senate began sessions yesterday. Everyone seemed a little confused at the start, but as the session progressed each member began to master his job. James Dague said that the legislature has three main objectives this year: to learn how a bill becomes a law, to learn the duties and responsibilities of the members of the House and Senate, and to work on material to be presented to the West Virginia legislature.

Yesterday was a day of learning and a day to outline the procedure. No bills were passed. Ryan Powell, from Marion cottage, stated, "it is a very complex procedure, but we will get things accomplished." Sean Swiger, the Speaker of the House, stated he plans to pass many bills that not only further the camp, but also bring the camp to a higher level than in previous years. When asked about the first day, President of the Senate, Moore Capito, stated, "We're trying to work the kinks out, so we can hit the ground running." Also, all members of both the House and the Senate were sworn in by the Supreme Court Justices.



Finally, Our own honorable Governor Underwood staffed Boys State in the Fifties.



A. James Manchin is a Democrat representative from Marion County. He was elected in 1998 and serves on the following committees:



The Mountaineer Staff asked several counselors about their Boys State experience, and why they come back each year. Here is what they had to say:

"This is my seventh year of Boys' State, and I wouldn't keep coming back if it wasn't a positive experience. You learn from the positives and negatives every year and it helps you become a better counselor. It makes you want to come back every year and improve on what you're done in previous years. "When I came here as a citizen in 1980 it was one of the best experiences of my life. It was such a wonderful thing that I wrote a letter to the administrator asking to come back as a Jr. Counselor. I came back in 1981 as a Jr. Counselor in Upshur Cottage. I had a wonderful time as a Jr. Counselor. I've come back nearly every year since. This is my sixteenth year as a counselor. I've been a Jr. or Sr. Counselor in nine of the thirteen cottages. It is very satisfying work. I feel that I get as much back from the boys as they hopefully get from me. The counselors and staff of Boys' State are like family to me and Boys' State is like a family reunion. Ben Rodriguez (Marion) is originally from Glendale, WV. He was a Boys' State citizen in 1991, and has been counselor in Marion cottage since 1992. He has been a member of the Boys' State staff for 8 years. His greatest memory would be the great programs, and he enjoys the interest in politics from the citizens. He has had a lot of good times, and all of his citizens have been different.

Clarence Walton (Monroe) is originally from Moundsville, WV. He is a veteran and started in 1991 as a Junior Counselor at Panhandle. He has been a Senior Counselor at Braxton and Monroe cottages. Clarence says Monroe will be his final resting place. He has been here for a total of eight years. Last year he was elected to the Boys' State Board of Directors. His greatest memory would have to be his 1998 citizens.

Michael Park (Randolph) originally lived in Moorsville, WV. He attended Boys' State as a citizen in 1984 where he resided in Braxton cottage. He was elected the Commissioner of Agriculture. He was selected to attend Boys' Nation. He was a Junior Counselor in Gilmer cottage for two years, and Senior Counselor in Barbour cottage from 1987 through 1992. He has been Senior Counselor in Randolph since 1993. His greatest moment would have to be in 1987 when he won his first Fugitt Award as a Senior Counselor in Barbour cottage.

Chad Bolton (Barbour) resides in Huntington. Like most citizens of Boys State, Bolton found the activities tedious and tiring. But, by the end of the week, he didn't want to leave. Neil Bolyard is the Senior Counselor in Webster Cottage. He is originally from Morgantown, WV. Bolyard comes back each year because he believes that Boys' State is the most effective program to expose men to very important activities. He also enjoys returning because it gives him the chance to meet new people and see old friends.

Nathan McBrayer is the Senior Counselor in Calhoun Cottage. He presently lives in Teays Valley, WV.
