IN LOVING MEMORY OF ROBERT L. STINE



Robert L. "Bob"
Stine was one of those special people, a personable man who quietly and steadily distinquished himself via a commitment to others, through an investment in young men's lives. Stine, who lived in Sylvester from 1971 until his recent death and resided in Whitesville 20 years prior to that, had

been the Administrator of the Mountaineer Boys' State program since 1981 and had worked with the program since 1959.

One needed only to hear Bob Stine talk about Boys' State briefly, to grasp his feelings for and dedication to the program. Stine proudly stated "We're the second oldest Boys' State program in the nation and our program is respected and recognized as a model for other Boys' State programs around the country." West Virginia's, Mountaineer Boys' State, has been going strong for 65 years now.

Stine's pride ran even deeper when he addressed the impact that Boys' State has had, and continues to have, in young men's lives. "It is such a positive experience for that select group, that it impacts lives from that point on," he commented. "These young men develop friendships and acquaintances that will last throughout their lives, and that circle adds new bonds each year. Our Boys' State group really resembles a family."

Bob Stine, who retired as a manager with the State Public Service Commission in 1992, graduated from Tyler County High School in 1950. He graduated from Morris Harvey College with a double major in Marketing and Management, sandwiching his education around a stint in Korea, and going to work for the state in 1958.

After retiring, and following a quadruple heart bypass, Bob enjoyed spending time with his wife, Jewell, daughters, Betty Ann and Cindy, and his three granddaughters. He attended Whitesville First Baptist Church, and of course, there was the Boys' State program.

Stine concluded, "I actually put about six months of preparation each year into that one week of Boys' State, but it has certainly always been worth the effort." Stine viewed his commitment and effort as an investment in our country's future, in continuing and protecting our democratic way of government, and in the lives of young men who will be tomorrow's civic leaders.

In 1997, Bob Stine was presented the Distinguished West Virginian Award by Governor Cecil Underwood for his 37 years of service to Mountaineer Boys' State. The award was presented during the 60th Boys' State session at Jackson's Mill. His dedication to that investment and his pride in its rewards had been the driving force behind Bob Stine's well-deserved recognition as a Distinguished West Virginian! He will truly be missed as a member of The Mountaineer Boys' State family.

TOUCH SCREEN VOTING: A FIRST FOR BOYS' STATE

Already used in several counties in West Virginia, this is the first year that touch screen voting will be used at Mountaineer Boys' State. Governor Bob Wise and Secretary of State Joe Manchin III were instrumental in bringing this system here, according to Cline.

This new way of voting seems as if it will be a change for the better. If all goes well, it may be at Boys' State for years to come.

BAR EXAM RESULTS

Citizens of the 2002 Mountaineer Boys State sat for the MBS Bar Examination on Sunday evening, June 9. A makeup examination was given on Monday morning for those citizens unable to take the Sunday evening examination. A total of 386 citizens sat for the Bar. 160 citizens passed the Bar, for a pass rate of 41.4%. Citizens had to score a 74% to pass.

This year's highest score was 96%, scored by Brian Britton of Lewis Cottage. Notable mentions also go to Andrew Beatty, Lewis, and Alex Weinstein, Kanawha, who both scored 94%.

The average score for all citizens was 68.69%. Listed below is the average score of each cabin.






The status of the Boys' State Bank and losing the perfect story







Federalist Party Platform Typed by Jason Crighton

- 1. The Federalist Party wished to take a position on tighter smoking restrictions in public places. Smoking in public places will be illegal by law. Public places that wish to have smoking may obtain permits. Permits will be given upon inspection. The suggested requirements include separate rooms for smokers and increased ventilation. Leading the way into the future leaps at a time!

We all know that the Nationalists are the better party, but instead of just telling jokes and supplying information that doesn't necessarily further our proposition, we feel that it is time to give actual reason. Our real, and most feasible platform is as follows:

Our first goal, and platform plank, is to increase the funding for such programs as Medicare and Medicaid. We feel that if we sacrifice a little more today while we can handle it, then tomorrow when we can't, we can rest assured that our future is in good hands. All because we paid a little extra a little earlier.

Our second platform plank is lessened taxes on big business. The Nationalist Party believes that this should be abolished because of the outdated tyrannical dogma that it perpetuates. Our final plank deals with the touchy issue of stem cell research. While we, as an entire party, feel that stem cell research can cure the diseases of the world, we also feel that it should be strictly limited. It has been shown that stem cells can be taken from the spine of a donor adult human. These can then be used for research following the limits that exist today. Think of the possibilities that will abound for us if we simply change the place from whence we get these cells. Voluntary donors are the future of medicine.

For the furthering of our nation and the realm of feasibility that has been declared, we can and will lead this state into the future, gaining each new level by leaps and bounds, attainable only through the election and support of the Nationalist Party.
