
Governors debate. Hilarity ensues.

In the great history of this country, there are many speeches that shall always be remembered in history. Examples of such oratorical masterpieces include Dr. Martin Luther King's "I had a dream", and President Lincoln's Gettysburg Address. One speech that will not find its way into the chronicles of history, however, is Governor candidate Kyle Reese's "Shut up before I smack you in the poof" speech.

Barboursville's own Kyle Reese

Barboursville's own committed what can be best described as an act of suicide political upon threatening his running mate during the debate. (Reese later lost the election, roughly over gaining thirteen percent of the vote.)

I spoke with Nationalist Governor candidate Jake "Afro Man" Lockett shortly after the debate. Jake, known by many as "Afro", is a very tall, charismatic young man with a big Afro and an even larger smile.

When I found him for my interview, he was surrounded by a group of friends, and I soon see why. When I first talk to him, he is inviting, and treats me as if I've been his friend for quite some time. And there's a sincerity about this matter that's comforting.

"I missed out on swimming and different activities so I could study to become Governor." He said.

Lockett was incredulous upon hearing Federalist Governor candidate Kyle Reese's verbal attacks to both himself and the Nationalist audience. "[I thought,] 'I swear he didn't say that." Afro Man told me. "Why would he be insulting the people you're trying to get votes from?"

Reese, who paralleled separation of smokers and nonsmokers in public places to racial segregation, yelled at members of the Nationalist party to be quiet while he was

talking, and specifically pointed one citizen out.

"We're all trying to be one government." Lockett added. "I want to do the best I possibly can [if elected.]."

I later caught up with Reese at the Assembly Hall,

immediately after he had cast his ballot. Mr. Reese had no comment for this story, but other members of Mountaineer Boys' State did.

Kenneth Kerr III, a Federalist from Monroe Cabin, said this about the Debate: "I thought it was all right, but they should have given Reese the time to speak."

Supreme Court Judge Joe "Boxer" Conrad (N-Lewis), who received the third highest amount of votes for his position, believes that Reese could have won, assuming things went differently. "I think he had a chance to be in the running until he lost his cool." He said.

Hummel Addresses Citizens

On Wednesday Evening the citizens of Mountaineer Boys State received the distinct honor of being addressed by Major Michael Hummel. Major Hummel served the United States in The Persian Gulf War in the early 1990's as well as in combat with the Army Air Corp Paratroopers during the Grenada conflict.

The Major began his speech by explaining to the citizens that America was founded on the basic, Godly, principles and patriotic ideals. He went further to explain that history's greatest Americans shared these ideals. He referred to such famous patriots as President George Washington, General George S. Patton, General Charles Yeager and the right Reverend Billy Grahm, who also held these ideals above all



else. The major explained that, in his eyes, the citizens of boys state were young patriots who had within them the potential to be a generation greater than even any of these.

He then spoke of courage, referring to Captain Nathan Hale, the famous espionage agent and martyr of the American Revolution who said, as Hummel quoted, "I regret that I have but one life to [give] for my country."

Major Hummel concluded his speech with a challenge to the young generation: to carry on the ideals and principles of our forefathers, those who framed and defended our great nation. But he added, that from the example he saw in the citizen's display during the review, he saw no possible obstacle for a group of young men so rooted in patriotism to take up such a worthy task.

A Visit from Governor Wise

Boys State recently had a most special visitor yesterday afternoon. West Virginia Governor Bob Wise arrived from the sky and descended to the terrain of Boys' State by a helicopter to attend the Formal Review.

I was lucky enough to obtain a quick interview with Governor Wise in front of Boys State HQ.

Governor Wise told me that what he most wanted the citizens of Boys' State to learn at Weston's Mill was the basic tools of organizing. "It's not about winning the election." He said, "It's what you do when you win."

Wise also denied the existence of a bylaw in the Promise Scholarship that would make some students pay the scholarship back eventually in the event that monies for it ran out.

An alumnus of Mountaineers Boys' State, Wise also emphasized that he is one of the programs

"In both Boys State and Girls State, what I see is West Virginia's future, and what I see is very bright." Wise announced at the beginning of his speech to the crowd of citizens and suchlike who attended the Formal Review.

The Governor thanked the American legion, and stated that he sat where Boys State citizens now sit many years ago. It was here, Wise says, that he first ran for governor... and lost in the primaries. He said that no longer was Boys State divided into Nationalists and Federalists. There are now only citizens.

Wise also discussed the Promise Scholarship, and how it exceeded all expectations. It was believed that approximately 2,700 would qualify this year, when in fact the amount was 3,862, an over one hundred and forty percent increase.

Governor Wise spoke of the different paths available to West Virginia's youth, and ended his speech with this statement: "Whatever you do, whichever path you follow, be proud of your state."



In a turn of events that was surprising to all those who based their opinions on word of mouth, the Nationalist party with figurehead Jake "Afro Man" Lockett swept the general elections on Tuesday Evening. The Federalists are down but most certainly not out, as they too received elections to several key state positions. The downfall of the Feds seemed to lie within their political addresses and the program in which they presented them.

The Fed's presentation, which included a painful combination of misinformation, hackneyed cliches and a five-minute rock concert to fill time left by the severely under-spoken candidates, can only be attributed to a severe lack of organization. Candidate-for-Governor Kyle Reese's "speech" was filled by a full minute of intro music. Candidates presenting more competent, however long-winded, speeches were applauded off the stage by the masses of the party in the bleachers. The single shining moment of the Fed campaign that evening was the keynote speech presented by Ryan King, if for no other reason than the fact that he actually followed his scripted speech. The lack of organization began a negative wave of opinion in the crowd, which carried over into the ensuing debates.

The Nationalist assembly program, while traditional, was carried out more efficiently and made better use of the allotted time. Governor-elect Lockett's speech was standard; a presentation of political goals and a few rallying cries, but at least it followed form. At the end of the evening, not a single Nationalist, to my knowledge, removed their nametag.

The results of the election are clear evidence of the effect that a poor campaign assembly can have upon the election. An entertaining performance is no substitute for knowledge of the issues and obvious party support. The downfall of the Federalist Party was the fault of many people, and no one scapegoat could possibly bear all the blame. The events of Tuesday Evening should serve as an example to future Boys' State citizens as how good candidates with good ideas can be lost in a mass of poor execution. The campaign is over; these are the lessons we have learned. As we cannot go back, we must move forward.
