
# The State of the State Address

At ten o'clock on Thursday morning, Gover-

nor Frank Wang addressed a joint session of the legislature. The speech marked Wang's first official Legislative address, and it was where he proposed the budget.

Wang's speech was brief, but his message was powerful. To quote, "Wasteful spending will undo all of the work of previous generations of this great state of West Virginia." In his speech. Wang outlined his ideas and explained what he felt to be the areas of West Virginia that needed the most immediate funding. Including in these were Education, health insurance, roads and highways, and workThis year, the budget surplus was calculated at 641 million dollars, and while no definitive



plans were disclosed, it is apparent that not a dime of the budget surplus money will be wasted. All of the previously mentioned ideas will receive priority when it comes time to divide up the surplus funds.

Health insurance received special attention from Wang. The governor emphasized the fact that it is imperative that families are able to afford quality health insurance in order to provide quality health care for their children. **Emphasis** was placed on the idea that healthy children would help provide a healthy future for the state of West Virginia.

Wang's speech was short, but it was to the point. He was passionate about the areas to which he felt the money should go, and he was interrupted several times

for applause, including a rather boisterous round when he mentioned worker's compensation.

## **Senate & House Report**

The House and the Senate reconvened at 8:25 Thursday morning. Senate President Evan Wolfe and Speaker of the House Austin Moore wasted no time in commencing the consideration of legislation. While several bills placed on the floor concerned the government of the actual state of West Virginia, legislation regarding the practices and procedures

of Mountaineer Boys State earned consideration.

In the Senate, a bill concerning Boys Nation passed unanimously and after a brief stint on the floor at the Senate, t became the first bill passed by our 2003 legislature. According to this bill, the senior counselor of each respective cabin has the right to select one citizen from each cabin to be considered and interviewed to represent West

Virginia in Mountaineer Boys State.

Other important bills were passed in the House, and now placed in Senate committees to be considered when tomorrow's session begins. These bills include Workers Compensation, a tobacco tax increase, teacher pay raises, and a bill regarding weighted grades for high school Advanced Placement courses.

The American Legion Mountaineer Boys' State now has a brand new website online which provides information on schedules, elections, and other events that are currently occurring and have occurred at Boys' State. Michael Sluss and Jacob McCarty are the driving forces behind the new site.

"It is a lot of really hard and tedious work, but it is a good thing and is pretty fun," Sluss and McCarty agreed.

This is not, however, the first site that Mountaineer Boys' State has had online. McCarty shared that back in 1999, Boys' State had a webpage and it did quite well. Unfortunately, the site went down in 2001 when the designer decided he was done working on it.

"I thought the site was really good," McCarty said, "and the parents really liked being able to check up on what their sons were up to at Jackson's Mill. After the site went down, Clarence Walton called me up and asked me if I would help out getting the site back running."

Starting off with a small page with information and updates on

McCarty's personal website, he sent the link of the site to others he knew to get people involved and interested. But McCarty realized that Mountaineer Boys' State deserved something even better.

"I knew that we needed a better site for Boys' State," McCarty shared, "but it's a lot of work and I knew I needed help. I asked around and Steve Sluss mentioned that his son Michael knew some about computers. So I got together with him, talked things over, and now we're both working on the new site."

And they have been working extremely hard. McCarty and Sluss are constantly updating the site all day, whenever they have time.

"Parents and other relatives are always wanting to keep an eye on their kids," said Sluss, "so we are having to constantly update the site and upload new pictures. It makes the day really long. Normally, we are up to 1:00 or 2:00 in the morning."

The new site, http://www.
mountaineerboysstate.org, has everything from a schedule of events, to pictures of assemblies and the Formal Review, and other events and updates, such as how the voting

went, the different classes citizens attend, and the many jobs citizens are now holding. "The site has been doing really good so far," said Sluss. "People are constantly checking the site for updates. The night of the elction, we had more then 200 hits on the site and 200 more by morning. Now, we have had more than 1,000 hits in just two days. Also, when we started on Saturday, we had about 300 files on the site. Now, we have over 2,300 files on the page."

The Boys' State site, unfortunately, will only be up for about a month after this week. Then, McCarty and Sluss will start on updating for the 2004 Mountaineer Boys' State.

But citizens of will have another opportunity to keep their ties to Boys' State. Mountaineer Boys' State has obtained a group name from Yahoo! for citizens to come together in forums and keep in touch with each other.

"The forums are a good way for citizens to discuss different issues with each other," shared McCarty, "as well as simply keep up to date with each other. All citizens have to do is go to http://www.yahoogroups.com, search under government for "Mountaineer Boys' State," and then sign up to join the community."

# A. James Manchin Visits Boys' State

Members of the American Legion Mountaineer Boys' State were given an extreme honor Wednesday night—hearing one of West Virginia's most respected orators in history. Playing to an already energized crowd, Manchin used his trademark oratorical skills to motivate the crowd of close to 400.

The agenda of the 77-year-old Manchin included the story of a POW named Captain Christian, who failed to surrender to the Japanese in World War II. "He was moaning and groaning," Manchin says, "but he would not give up the flag to his country."

He then enthusiastically made this statement about burning the flag: "Nobody, anywhere, has the right to burn the flag of the United States." Cheers followed, and Boys' State citizens gave Mahchin a long, standing ovation.

Manchin also talked about his love for the Mountain State. "How beautiful this place called West Virginia," he declared. He also gave

Randolph counselor Adam Miller the West Virginia state flag and told him that when anyone says anything bad about West Virginia to "break their arms off".




Toward the end of his speech, he told the members of Boys' State to think about their future. He urged the Boys' State citizens to never cut corners in life. Manchin closed by saying, "Go out and conquer the world, because it belongs to you."

Other members of the audience received gifts, such as state pins, from him throughout his speech, and several citizens stayed afterward to shake his hand and pose for pictures.

Delegate Manchin has been a major participant in Mountaineer Boys' State ever since he attended the weeklong event in the 1940s. He has bought numerous items for Boys' State and has come back to speak to its new citizens for many years now. He says that he still remembers singing the Mountaineer Boys' State official song, "Men of Tomorrow".

His attendance here at Jackson's Mill was a starting point for Manchin's political career. He became a member of the West Virginia House of Delegates when he was only 21. Between 1977 and 1985 Manchin served as West Virginia's Secretary of State, and from 1985 to 1989, he was State Treasurer.

For the next nine years, Manchin stayed out of state government, but in 1998, fifty years after his first appointment to the House of Delegates, he gave it another shot and won the seat. He is running for yet another term in the next election.

On July 22, 1949, he married his bride, Shirley Wilson Marria. To this union were born three children: Helen, Donna, and Walter Keith.

At Darlington United Methodist Church in South Charleston where he was Chairman of both the Administrative Counsel and on the Board of Trustees. He was employed at Union Carbride Corp. in South Charleston as maintenance supervisor from 1951-1987.
