

FBI, PHD duo teach youth about leadership

What do Martin Luther King, Jr., Franklin D. Roosevelt, Adolf Hitler, and Ronald Reagan have in common? Today, they were all recognized as great leaders in the Leadership Seminar in the Assembly Hall. Chris Enourato, a retired D.C. police officer and a current employee of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, along with Dr. Jim Nolan, a retired officer and current West Virginia University professor, discussed with the Boys State groups what qualities a leader possesses. "Being able to exhibit leadership at the right time is the best quality a leader can possess," Nolan stated. Boys' State groups noted that a leader is confident, responsible, trustworthy, and loyal.

Enourato elaborated on leaders and broke them down into three categories: autocratic (total control), democratic (shared control), laissezfaire (minimal control). Dr. Jim Nolan went on to talk about the Tao Te Ching, an book of ancient Chinese philosophy, and how it portrays a leader. Dr. Nolan explained everyone goes through four stages as a leader: dependence, conflict, resolution, and interdependence. Dr. Nolan and Enourato let the citizens apply the knowledge they learned by interpreting some models using what the citizens know about leadership. As one can see, a leader possesses many distinct qualities and hopefully Boys' State will bring these qualities out of you.



NEWSCASTER SHARES IMPORTANCE OF PRESS RELATIONS

Rob Johnson, a former Boys' Stater of 1979, is a news anchor from Channel 3 News out of Huntington/Charleston WSAZ. Johnson says that news began with the U.S. Constitution. "It's one thing," he says, "to have freedom of speech, but to have freedom of the press is bigger." Speech lets a person talk about small things, but

the press was established to be the "watchdog of the government." They have the ability to inform everyone about how the government is being run.

Being an election year, this is especially important. Mr. Johnson says, "The only way to know about the candidates is to know both sides of the story." At Channel 3 News, Mr. Johnson says that if they cover one candidate, they bend over backward to interview the other (s) in the same race. believe that it is wrong to give a biased report at Channel 3. The ethical thing to do is to let you "think for yourself."

Johnson says that during election time, not a whole lot will change. Besides interviewing all the candidates and getting all the facts out, there won't be a big difference in the structure of the news program. The only differences you will see is a lot of political commercials for candidates. Another change will be the debate they encourage every year with local candidates. If you're local to the Huntington/Charleston area, be sure and watch the debate. Not only am I sure it will be a good one, it will also give you a good idea about who you will want to vote for.

Voting Procedures incorporated in learning

As Mountaineer Boys' State opened its doors for the 67th time, its citizens marched into classrooms behind the dining hall to explore politics and government. During every citizen's morning schedule, they were required to attend a voting procedure class.

The focus of the voting procedure class is to educate the citizens about the different ways voting is carried out in their hometowns throughout the state, and to educate them about voting in the two elections that will take place at Mountaineer Boys' State.

"There are five different ways to vote in an election," said voting procedure instructor Danny Kline, "touch screen, paper ballot, voting machine, punch card, and optical scan voting."

The majority of the state still uses the original paper ballot that must be counted by hand, the second most popular is the punch card ballot system of voting. Only a handful of counties choose to use optical scanning or voting machines, and only one county, Cabell, uses the touch screen style of voting.

To some people it would seem that West Virginia is living in

the dark ages when it comes to voting, but to others sticking with the older systems just makes sense.

"Why switch to touch screens," Kline asked his class, "why would you change to new touch screen system when you haven't had a problem with the punch cards? Don't fix it if it isn't broke."

After learning the ins and outs of voting in the state of West Virginia, citizens are instructed on the voting procedure at Mountaineer Boys' State.


The voting process won't be the same as it was the previous year. Boys State will be taking a step backwards this year as far as technology goes. In place of the touch screen voting system used last year, citizens will see the old paper ballots.

"We had planned to do that (touch screen voting) this year but the company that provides that service to us was busy across the nation since it is a year where several primaries have been held," said Kline.

Although Boys' State has taken steps back in technology, it continues to take steps forward with the youth of today by educating and involving its citizens in these exciting voting procedures.




