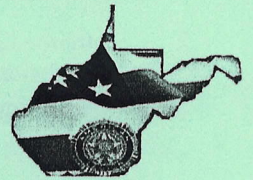

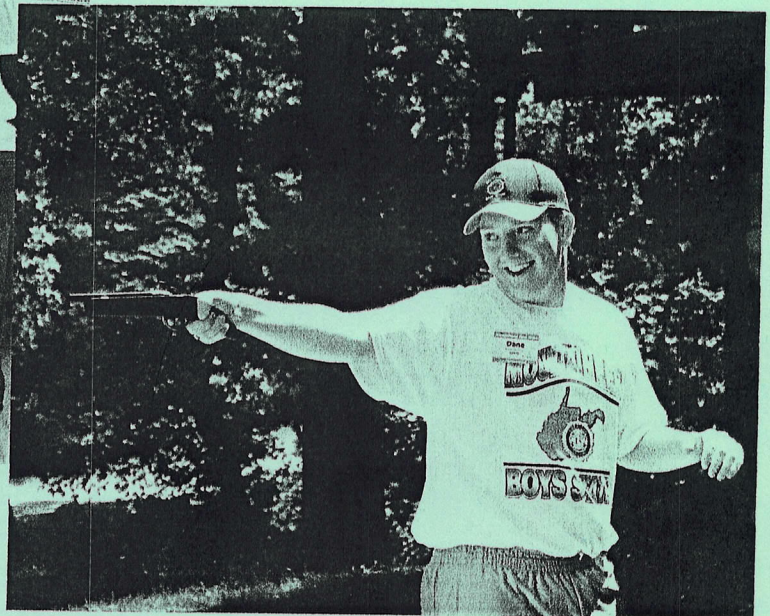

A tragic event occurred around 3 in the afternoon on Thursday as there was a hostage attempt on the Governor, Dane Hamilton. The alert was made to the newspaper staff when two people sent by Hamilton reached the Headquarters building. The staff members present raced down to the scene, and were overtaken by the National Guard who was sprinting to the same location. Upon arriving on the scene, the National Guard secured the area, and prohibited the press from entering the Jackson Lodge building. From various sources the press was able to piece together the events that occurred inside of the building prior to their arrival and are as follows: Mohit entered the Governor's office and stated his demands. He had TNT strapped to his waist, and was threatening to blow up the building if he did not get one million dollars. Hamilton was seen exiting the building after tricking one of his captors into handing him a pistol. The Governor was relocated to Marion Cottage where he was kept for safe-keeping because of their great compassion. Nolan Harvath, the Attorney General, stated that "the governor was taken to Marion because it is the safest place to be in Jackson's Mill." Mohit was then escorted to the Bank by the National Guard because he still had the bomb strapped to his chest, and was threatening to kill them all. When arriving at the bank, the State Police finally showed up because they tried to pull over the press members who were running to the scene. At the bank, the police and National Guard surrounded the building as Mohit was taken into the building where he was to gain the money that he sought. He slowly released hostages from the inside, and many suspects were taken down on the outside, where a soccer ball and phone were confiscated because of the suspicion that they were part of a bomb. One of the press members, Josh Nicholson, was patted down by the National Guard just for the fun of it. A suspect who was being led away by the State Police stated when being interviewed "We were hostage-ing the governor, and trying to get a million dollars from the bank." The National Guard concocted a plan to take down Mohit by protecting the hostages, and jumping on top of him so he could not blow himself up. The press then took off down to Marion Cottage because rumors circulated that the Governor was in trouble again, and the State Troopers took off at full speed towards the cottage. Once at Marion, the press was once again denied their right to gather information by the State Troopers. The State Troopers surrounded the building, and became uptight. Then the situation was wrapped up and nicely ended. The mayor of Fairmont stated "the only thing they did was bring shame to their families, and shows how great Marion really is." A quote from Governor Dane Hamilton says "the Senate and House of Delegates rejected bills that would help protect me." So protect yourselves citizens of Mountaineer Boys State because it is a dangerous world.

Whether you've sprained your ankle playing soccer, thrown your arm out from baseball, have severe sunburn, or broken your fingers from too much writing, Mountaineer Boys State's medical staff is there to help. There are five professionals on this year's staff: Dr. Jerry Dague, Nurse Debbie Hoag, William Poe, Justin Evans, and Randall Kocsis.

Dr. Jerry Dague is from Wheeling, West Virginia, and he deals mostly with emergency medicine. He attended Marshall University's School of Medicine, has a B.S. Degree in Biology from Fairmont State University and had a residency at Wheeling Medical Park. He currently works between Reynolds Memorial Hospital and Wheeling Medical Park. Dague is married with three kids, two girls and a boy. He has his pilot's license and owns a two-seated Ultralight.

Nurse Debbie Hoag has a Masters Degree in Nursing and is an assistant professor at Fairmont State University. Hoag has been in Nursing for thirty-five years. She is a mother of two daughters and one son. She is also a grandmother, boasting six grandchildren. Hoag enjoys painting and took a painting class in high school. She teaches an online course for the University of Phoenix, and, even though she likes computers, she says she has a tendency to mess them up, but never beyond her repair. When she's finished with them, they usually turn out better than before.

Willie Poe was a citizen here at Boys State back in 2005 and was the Chairman for the Nationalist Party as well as his city's fire chief. When he was fifteen, he joined a rescue squad because he was too young

to be the first responder. Poe also became an EMT when he was eighteen. Here at Mountaineer Boys State, Willie deals with major emergencies (broken bones, oxygen deprivation, heat, etc.). He likes watching *South Park*, *The King of Queens*, and *The Daily Show with John Stewart*.

He likes hunting, fishing, playing with his dogs, and spending time with his fiancée, Kimberly. Evans was a citizen in 1997 and enjoys assemblies, band, and the Formal Review.

Last, but not least, is Randall Kocsis. Mr. Kocsis attended Fairmont High School and received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Criminal Justice from Fairmont State University. He became a certified EMT in 1981. His mother is a Nurse Practitioner, and his brother is a Registered Nurse, EMT, and firefighter. Our medical staff here is the best available. With these highly-trained and knowledgeable individuals, there is no medical emergency that cannot be handled, but, just in the case of an extremely intense emergency, a patient would be transferred to the Stonewall Jackson Hospital.

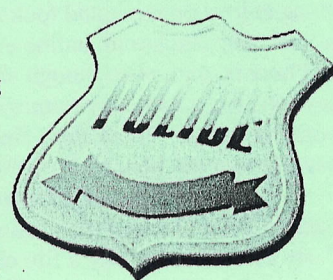
Marion Sports Start Strongly
